R E P O R T

OF THE

Chief Engineer of the Fire Department.



To the Hon. Mayor and Aldermen and Common Council :

GENTLEMEN—I herewith submit my Annual Report of the condition and wants of the Fire Department of the City of Roxbury.

The number of Hand Engines in active use is three, which, with one Steam Fire Engine, one Hose Carriage and one Hook and Ladder Carriage, constitutes the entire force of the apparatus now in service.

I am fortunate in being able to state that we have been able to cope with any fire that has occurred during the past year without having received any assistance from abroad. If the City Government will see that our means of getting water, by the construction of additional reservoirs, hydrants, &c., are increased, we shall not deem it necessary to urge an increase of the department. In this connection, I feel called upon to call attention to the lack of an adequate supply of water in case of fire in the southerly section of Ward Five, in the neighborhood of Dennis Street. The dry weather of last summer and fall rendered the deficiency of water very apparent. The construction of one or more reservoirs in that locality would be of invaluable assistance in that growing district.

The department is in good, working condition, the apparatus and machines have been carefully kept in good repair. We take

pleasure in commending the rubber hose, manufactured by the Boston Belting Company, as the most serviceable hose of any now made for the use of the Steam Fire Engine. The thorough trials we have given it the past year, attests its superiority for durability, cheapness, &c.

The Companies attached to the Engines are all full, but we cannot forget that many of the most efficient and faithful firemen of other years, have cheerfully and promptly volunteered to serve their country, in the army and navy, against the rebels of the South, and handle the musket, sabre, or cannon with as much alacrity as they ever "manned the brakes."

The accompanying documents give a full report of the members of the department, the condition of the Engines and apparatus, list of hydrants and reservoirs, and the general condition of the department.
