Capt Dennis Duscoll of Engine 37 has had many thrilling experiences during his 20 years with the Fire Department. The one incident that stands out most vividly in his career is the First National Bank Building fire a few years

"I responded to the alarm," he says, "after awakening from a sound sleep at 1 o'clock in the morning. We reached the scene and found the big granite the scene and found the org gramte structure, five stories high, corner of State and Devonshire sts, a mass of fames. The fire broke out in the air shaft in the center of the building. The fames were leading 30 feet in the air. "On the top floor lived the jantor, W. H Goldthugite, his wife and 12-year-old son Mrs Goldwaite had been awakened by the smoke; arousing the others, all escaped the roof. where LO screeches could be heard a block away.

"It was impossible to reach them with the ladders on account of the flames that were shooting out over all sides. With several other firemen I went into the building and we made our way gave me through the dense smoke to the top member." floor, where we found the three of them. The mother and son were unconscious.
