## CAPT J. F. McMAHON LADDER 1

"A fire that I will always remember. and one that came near proving fatal to the members of Egnine Company 8. was a fire on a Sunday in the old Tremont Temple. I had been in the department only a short time when this fire occurred.

"The company was ordered to run a line up the stair way to the upper bal-cony, where the heat and smoke were intense. After passing water some time, it was suddenly shut off, leaving the company in a bad way.

"When we found that the water was gone, we shut the nozzle almost off and started to grope our way to a window. As we left the pipe, a large safe fell through an office floor from above and crashed through the balcony floor, just where we had been working.

"The water came and we were right a hard-looking lot when we reached the on the job, when an order was received street." to drop everything and get out quick. On making the stairway the roof fell in-burying the members of the company, We helped each other out from under the debris and found that one was miss-

"We searched, and rescued hoseman J. M. Elliott, who had been completely buried. We were fortunate that none of us was seriously injured, but we were
