By referring to the department roll of he first saw service.

merit it will be found that he has enacted the role of life-sater on two occasions. One of his heroic acts was performed at a fire at 43 Fellows st. Roxbury, Aug 14, 182 and another at 53 Shawmut ay, on Jan 29, 1833. The chief is very modest and is never heard to say anything in regard to the brave feats he has performed

Sawyer began to fight fires at the age of 16, when he entered the fire department of the city of Portland He en-listed as a torch boy in Civic engine company & to which he was attached

until its disbandment

He left the Portland department and enlisted on Aug 5 1862, in Co B, 10th Maine regt and served until May 14. While a member of the regiment he figured in many important battles. and left the service with a creditable record

He came to Boston in 1869 and worked at his trade that of a carpenter, until he entered the fire department. In 1872 he was appointed a call substitute on ladder 4 and on Oct 1, 1873 his rating was changed to call man He continued to act in that capacity until April, 1877, when he was promoted to assistant foreman, but remained on duty with the

foreman, but remained on duty with the ladder company.

On July 31, 1880, as a reward for his efficiency, the board of commissioners honored him with a promotion to the rank of captain and he was transferred to ladder company 12, Tremont st, Roxbury On Nov 1, 1884, he was promoted to the grade of district chief and was given command of the 8th district, which then embraced a portion of Roxbury and the whole of Brighton. When the districts were rearranged in 1894, he was shifted to district II. Brighton, and was shifted to district II. Brighton, and remained there nearly a year, when he was returned to Roxbury and given control of the 9th district, where he has since been located

The chief is connected with many or-ganizations, including the G. A. R., the Maine Veterar. Firemen's association and the charitable and relief associations of the Boston department. He re-sides in Roxbury, where he has a host of friends

He has been selected to serve as chief marshal at the coming ball of the department. He makes his headquarters in the house of ladder company 4, where
