Fire Fighter Jeffrey Riley of Ladder Company 7 ascended the rear stairs, past the fire on the second floor and upon reaching the third floor encountered extreme heat and smoke conditions. He proceeded to search the kitchen, performing window ventilation as he progressed. He entered a side room where he located and removed a small child. He exited the room through the kitchen and went down the rear stairway and upon reaching the street level members of Engine 21 performed C.P.R. on the child.

Because these actions were performed at great personal risk, and while heavy fire and smoke conditions existed, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter Jeffrey Riley of Ladder Company 7 and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

On March 5, 1993, at 1529 hours, incident #7918, Engine Company 18 responded to Box 45-1892, a working fire struck for 11 Coleman Street, District 7.

On orders, Engine Company 18 ran a 2 1/2" line of hose via the rear stairs to the second floor and while encountering heat and smoke, proceeded into the kitchen and dining areas. At the same time, Lieutenant Dennis A. MacDonald of the Personnel Division, detailed to Engine Company 18, noticed Fire Fighter Riley of Ladder Company 7 coming down the rear stairway carrying a child under his arms. Fire Lieutenant MacDonald then went to the third floor to make a search. He went through the kitchen to the dining area where he located and picked up an unconscious child. He applied mouth to mouth resuscitation as he proceeded to the front of the building. He continued resuscitation until relieved by the Emergency Medical Services personnel.

Because these actions were performed while heavy fire and smoke conditions existed and at great personal risk, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Lieutenant Dennis A. MacDonald of the Personnel Division, detailed to Engine Company 18, and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

IV. COMMENDATION

On February 2, 1993, at 0354 hours, incident #3840, Rescue Company 1 responded to the Charles River locks upon report of a man in the water.

Upon arrival, members observed a man lying face down in the icy water. The air temperature was 15 degrees with a wind chill factor of minus 20 degrees. A roof ladder was put in place. Firefighters Lawrence P. MacDougall and Robert J. Culbert of Rescue Company 1, descended the ladder wearing survival suits. Upon stepping on the surface, the ice began to break up around them with large sharp pieces creating a hazardous condition. With great difficulty they managed to pull the victim into a Stokes basket which was hauled up by members of Ladder Company 24 and Rescue Company 1.

Because their actions were performed under adverse conditions, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to commend Fire Fighters Lawrence P. MacDougall and Robert J. Culbert of Rescue Company 1, and makes this commendation a part of their personnel folders.

BOARD OF MERIT

The Board of Merit, consisting of the Fire Commissioner and the Deputy Fire Chiefs, has considered all meritorious acts referred to it during the year 1992. After careful consideration and study, the Board submitted the following recommendations which are hereby approved by the Fire Commissioner:

Cases of Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief)
 Daniel F. Robishaw, Engine Company 39
 Fire Fighter James L. Berlo, Engine Company 39

At 0843 hours, March 24, 1992, the department responded to Box 7221 for a fire at 331 E Street, District 6. Upon arrival, heavy smoke was showing from the second floor. Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief) Daniel F. Robishaw and Fire Fighter James L. Berlo, both of Engine Company 39, while donning air masks, were informed by neighbors that the building, which appeared vacant, was being used by a homeless man as a shelter.

Both members immediately entered the building via a side door to conduct a search. They ascended the stairway to the second floor, entered the fire apartment which was heavily charged with heat and smoke, made their way to the front of the apartment, passed a room heavily involved in fire and located a man attempting to escape by way of a front window. Fire Fighters Robishaw and Berlo assisted the man toward a front window and while breaking a window from the inside, held the man's head and shoulders outside, enabling him to breathe. They called to members of Ladder Company 18 who were raising a ground ladder to an adjacent window.

Without warning, the man suddenly broke free and attempted to jump from the window. With extreme difficulty, Fire Fighters Robishaw and Berlo held the man by his legs as he dangled from the window, head down. Although the fire was gaining headway and their position was becoming untenable, they kept a tight hold on the man until he was removed to safety by members of Ladder Company 18.

Because both members performed this rescue at great personal risk, under adverse fire fighting conditions and before lines of hose were in operation and ventilation completed, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter (Aide to District Fire Chief) Daniel F. Robishaw and Fire Fighter James L. Berlo, Engine Company 39, for their life saving actions in General Order No. 19 of 1992.

The Board recommends that the names of Fire Fighter (Aide to District Fire Chief) Daniel F. Robishaw and Fire Fighter James L. Berlo, Engine Company 39, be placed on the Roll of Merit.



2. Cases of Fire Lieutenant Steven L. Baldassari, Personnel Division (Detailed to Ladder Company 23) Fire Fighter David A. Glover, Ladder Company 23 Fire Lieutenant Francis J. Manning, Engine Company 24 Fire Fighter Peter J. McDonnell, Engine Company 24 Fire Fighter Richard F. Paris, Engine Company 24

On May 5, 1992, at 1447 hours, Engine Company 24 and Ladder Company 23 responded to a building fire at 25 Wyoming Street, District 9, with reports of small children trapped within the building.

Upon arrival, members of both companies observed fire showing from the second floor of a four story brick dwelling. Fire Lieutenant Steven L. Baldassari, Personnel Division (detailed to Ladder Company 23) and Fire Fighter David A. Glover of Ladder Company 23 immediately ascended to the second floor to commence a search.

Fire Lieutenant Francis J. Manning and Fire Fighter Peter J. McDonnell of Engine Company 24 advanced an uncharged 1 3/4" attack line into the burning apartment. They positioned themselves between the room on fire and the members of Ladder Company 23 who were conducting the search. Members of both companies encountered extreme heat and smoke conditions on the second floor landing with fire extending into the common hallway.

Fire Lieutenant Baldassari and Fire Fighter Glover crawled into the burning apartment and proceeded via the hallway, beyond the main body of fire. Fire Lieutenant Baldassari entered a bedroom on the right and while searching on hands and knees located an infant in a crib. He then crawled from the room with the infant and removed him to the street in the care of Emergency Medical Services personnel on scene.

Fire Fighter Glover, under the same adverse conditions, while crawling, entered a bedroom on the left whereupon he located an unconscious child on the floor. He then removed the child from the burning apartment to the street.

Fire Fighter Richard F. Paris, Engine Company 24's pump operator, observed the second child brought to the street showing no visible vital signs. Knowing that the Emergency Medical Services personnel were busy administering to the first child, Fire Fighter Paris immediately took the infant, began CPR and performed unprotected mouth to mouth resuscitation for approximately ten minutes until relieved by Health and Hospital personnel.

Fire Lieutenant Manning and Fire Fighter McDonnell of Engine Company 24, while in the process of protecting the members of Ladder Company 23, although subjected to intense fire conditions, they aggressively attacked the fire, contributing greatly to the rescues. Fire Fighter McDonnell received first and second degree burns to his face, ear, shoulder and both legs.

Because these rescues were performed at great personal risk under severe fire, heat and smoke conditions, before ventilation was made or lines of hose charged, the Fire Commissioner highly commend Fire Fighter Steven McGillicuddy of Ladder Company 10 for his swift actions in General Order No. 20 of 1992.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Steven McGillicuddy, Ladder Company 10, be awarded the John E. Fitzgerald Medal for the Most Meritorious Act.

4. Case of Fire Fighter Leonard R. Pacino, Ladder Company 29

On May 4, 1992, Fire Fighter Leonard R. Pacino of Ladder Company 29, while off duty at 750 Adams Street, District 8, was informed of an 85 year old woman in cardiac arrest. He immediately checked for vital signs and finding none, commenced CPR, continuing for approximately ten to twelve minutes until arrival of Emergency Medical Services personnel and subsequent restoration of a heart beat.

Because of his dedication to duty, his quick action in saving the woman's life, reflecting credit upon himself and the Boston Fire Department, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter Leonard R. Pacino of Ladder Company 29 in General Order No. 25 of 1992.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Leonard R. Pacino, Ladder Company 29, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

5. Cases of Fire Fighter Thomas J. Blake, Ladder Company 16 Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief) Walter T. Cobe, Jr. Engine Company 53

On November 28, 1992, at 1507 hours, incident #41806, Box 3712 (three alarms) was struck for a fire in a duplex three story protected wood frame building at 816-818 River Street, District 12. Heavy smoke was showing on all floors with reports of children trapped on the upper floors. Fire Fighter Thomas J. Blake, Ladder Company 16 and Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief) Walter T. Cobe, Jr., Engine Company 53, were ordered to commence a search. Fire Fighter Blake ascended the interior stairs to the attic. Simultaneously, Fire Fighter Cobe climbed a 35 foot ladder to a dormer window where he removed his air tank and mask to gain entry.

Both members encountered extreme heat while making a diligent extensive search in a rear attic bedroom where they located two children beneath a bed. Fire Fighter Cobe, applying his facepiece to the child, exited via the hallway to the stairs where his air supply became exhausted. He was assisted down the stairs by a member of Engine Company 53. Fire Fighter Blake removed his facepiece and while applying it to the child, located a window and passed the child to a member of Ladder Company 28. Having exhausted his air supply, he was assisted from the building via the ladder.

Because both of these members performed these rescues, under adverse fire conditions and at extreme personal risk, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter Thomas J. Blake of Ladder Company 16 and Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief) Walter T. Cobe, Jr. of Engine Company 53 in General Order No. 1 of 1993.

The Board recommends that the names of Fire Fighter Thomas J. Blake, Ladder Company 16 and Fire Fighter (Aide to District Chief) Walter T. Cobe, Jr., Engine Company 53, be placed on the Roll of Merit.

6. Award of Recognition
District Fire Chief Gerard J. Molito, Special Services Division

District Fire Chief Gerard J. Molito of the Special Services Division, Safety Operational Unit, has been involved in developing programs and establishing procedures improving safety on the fireground and at all emergency incidents, while working closely with the Training, Maintenance and Research Division and Fire Alarm Section.

He was the moving force in the implementation and training program of the federally mandated Incident Command System, is involved in the development of a more effective Computer Aided Dispatch System, the establishment of a new record keeping system, and development of safety training bulletins, all undertaken with total dedication to duty and the promoting of a safer work environment.

The Board recommends that District Fire Chief Gerard J. Molito, Special Services Division, be awarded the Award of Recognition.

Fire Captain Thomas J. Quinn, Special Services Division

Fire Captain Thomas J. Quinn of the Special Services Division, Planning and Logistics Section, has improved many areas which have benefited the department's overall performance and the safety of its members and the general public.

His many tasks included the fire fighting water supply system, Life Safety Code, new construction, the CANA Charlestown Tunnel Project, the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel and Deer Island Projects, all undertaken with professional expertise and demeanor that encouraged engineers, architects and contractors to accede to lawful requirements and the department's requests without special legal efforts being expended.

The Board recommends that Fire Captain Thomas J. Quinn, Special Services Division, be awarded the Award of Recognition.

I. HIGH COMMENDATION

On April 16, 1993, at 1108 hours, incident #13055, companies responded to a still alarm for Boston City Hospital on report of a man threatening to jump. Ladder Company 15's aerial was positioned on the Massachusetts Avenue side of the Dowling Building. Fire Fighter Edward T. Loder of Rescue Company 1 was positioned and locked in for about one hour on the tip of Ladder Company 15's aerial which was fully extended and five feet short of the roof line.

A distraught person on the roof approached Fire Fighter Loder and threatened to jump if the aerial was not moved. The man suddenly climbed over the edge of the roof and proceeded down a conduit pipe. The aerial was quickly lowered to reach the victim who suddenly lost his grip and began to fall. Firefighter Loder, while extending himself from the very tip of the aerial, reached out and grasped the man's shirt as he fell past the aerial. As he took hold of the man's arms, Fire Fighter Loder was pulled over the beam of the aerial as his life belt was pulled below his hips. Two members came to his assistance. Fire Fighter Loder suffered multiple cuts and abrasions on his arm and shoulder as the aerial was being lowered to an adjacent roof.

Because of his life saving actions, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter Edward T. Loder of Rescue Company 1 who performed the rescue under great personal risk, and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

II. COMMENDATION

On April 16, 1993, at 1108 hours, incident #13055, companies responded to a still alarm for Boston City Hospital on report of a man threatening to jump. Ladder 15's aerial was positioned on the Massachusetts Avenue side of the Dowling Building.

District Fire Chief Michael C. Liotta of the Safety operational Unit and Fire Fighter Senior Man Lawrence C. Holt of Rescue Company 1, who were both on the turntable of Ladder 15, observed Fire Fighter Edward C. Loder of Rescue Company 1 struggling to hold onto a rescued person at the tip of the aerial. They quickly ascended and assisted in holding and steadying the two men while the ladder was being lowered to an adjacent roof.

Because they were instrumental in preventing injury to the victim and a fellow member, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to commend District Fire Chief Michael C. Liotta, Safety Operational Unit and Fire Fighter Senior Man Lawrence C. Holt of Rescue Company 1 and makes this Commendation a part of their personnel folder.

III. HIGH COMMENDATION

On April 22, 1993, at 0638 hours, incident #13864, Box 2-1565 was struck for a building fire at 25 Follen Street, District 4. Heavy fire was showing from the first and second floors of a four story brick building upon the arrival of Ladder Company 15. A working fire was reported.

Screams for assistance could be heard from the second floor apartment. After being denied entrance to the front of the building due to the first floor staircase being fully involved in fire, Fire Lieutenant Michael E. Tierney, Fire Fighters Brendan Collins and Sheldon K. Jackson of Ladder Company 15 raised a 35! ladder to the second floor window where a woman was previously seen. Entry through this window was unsuccessful due to permanent kitchen material blocking half the window.

Fire Fighter Collins climbed from the ladder, proceeded across the ledge of the building and gained entrance through the living room window. Encountering poor visibility, he crawled the perimeter of the apartment passing the original room of fire. He located an unconscious sixty year old female wedged behind a kitchen door. He removed his facepiece and placed it on the victim. Facing near exhaustion he dragged the victim towards the voice of Fire Fighter Jackson who was near the window. They proceeded in removing the victim. Fire Fighter Collins suffered lacerations to both hands and smoke inhalation. The victim suffered first and second degree burns to the face and smoke inhalation.

Because of his swift life saving actions during serious deteriorating fire conditions, before ventilation or placement of lines of hose and while under extreme personal risk, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter Brendan Collins of Ladder Company 15 and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

Immediately after the placement of the first ground ladder, Fire Lieutenant Tierney, with members of Ladder Company 17, were ordered to raise an additional 35' ladder to the third floor for the rescue of a person hanging from a window. Upon completion of this task, Fire Lieutenant Tierney returned to the ladder at the second floor where members of Ladder Company 15 had entered the building. He ascended to the ledge of the second floor window where he assisted Fire Fighters Jackson and Collins in removing the victim from the second floor apartment. In performing this rescue, Fire Fighter Jackson suffered burns to the chest and Fire Lieutenant Tierney burns to the neck.

Because of their assistance in the life saving rescue of the woman, while performing under great personal risk, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Lieutenant Michael E. Tierney and Fire Fighter Sheldon K. Jackson of Ladder Company 15 and refers their case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

IV. COMMENDATION

On Monday, June 21, 1993, Fire Alarm Operator Kenneth Fitzgibbon of the Special Services Division, while off duty and participating in a Boston Firefighters softball game at M Street Park, District 6, responded upon request for aid by parents attending Little League at an adjacent field. A young boy had been hit by a batted ball which shattered his eyeglasses, causing a deep gash over his right eye.

Fire Alarm Operator Fitzgibbon immediately controlled the bleeding and calmed the young boy. He reconstructed the shattered lenses until satisfied that no pieces had entered the eyes. While awaiting the arrival of the ambulance, he calmed and reassured the child's mother that the boy was not seriously hurt.

Because of his quick actions, reflecting a high level of professionalism and compassion, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to commend Fire Alarm Operator Kenneth Fitzgibbon of the Special Services Division and makes this commendation a part of his personnel file.

Little of Ladder Company 14 and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

The Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter David Crespo of Engine Company 14 for his assistance in the rescue while under great personal risk and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

I. FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire Prevention Week will be observed in the City of Boston from October 3 to October 9, 1993, inclusive.

During Fire Prevention Week, company officers and all members shall review the smoke detector laws so that people visiting the fire houses can get the correct answers to smoke detector laws.

Fire stations shall be open to the public between the hours of 1200 and 1700 hours for inspection of the premises and for the conveyance of information concerning the fire department functions and fire prevention matters. When citizens come to a station during Fire Prevention Week, the man on house patrol shall summon the commanding officer who should be available and ready to either show the visitors around the station and to answer the questions regarding the department, or to have a suitable person assigned to this duty. Handouts will be distributed prior to October 3, 1993 so that they may be given to the public when they visit the

The officer in charge of quarters shall see that the Fire Prevention Week plywood sign issued to all stations is displayed during this week. It is the responsibility of company officers to see to it that these signs are kept in good condition from year to year. Signs should be displayed from Sunday to Saturday. Signs shall be checked daily by the officer in charge of quarters to assure that they are firmly affixed to the building in a proper manner.

District Fire Chiefs are directed to take an active interest in Fire Prevention Programs in the following manner:

By making arrangements with the various plants and industrial enterprises within the district to hold fire drills during the week, by grading these drills as good, fair, or poor and making a report of same to the Fire Prevention Division, indicating the name of the enterprise, the date of the drill and the grade. Same should be forwarded promptly. Each concern should be requested to acknowledge participation in Fire Prevention Week activities via written correspondence. These drills should be conducted by a company officer after arrangements are made. At plants where there are given to assignments and/or response procedures. It is requested that the name of the company officer conducting the drill be furnished. It is anticipated that not less than three drills be conducted in each district.

Company officers will contact school officials in the schools in their sub-district and make arrangements to hold the required fire exit drills during Fire Prevention Week. The fire exit drill shall be so arranged that it will be held prior to the end of the school day.

The District Fire Chief should compile a list of fraternal, social, civic and professional organizations within the district and convey to them the willingness of the fire department to provide company officers for the purpose of lecturing on fire prevention at any time. District Fire Chiefs should make a concerted effort to bring the activities of the department before these organizations and arrange for lectures to be given. The name of any organization so participating should be reported to the Fire Prevention Division, specifically if the organization can be urged to forward on their own stationery a notation of the Department.

Firefighters are to pay special attention to the observance of fire hazards and to the duty of observing and locating fire hazards along the route followed by them in their coming to and going from daily work. All buildings being erected, demolished or significantly remodeled require permits, as do storage and use of flammable gases. Notify your District Chief and/or Fire Prevention Division at extension 3620. Dilapidated buildings, rubbish accumulation and other hazards should be reported in accordance with abatement procedure as outlined in S.O.P. 25. The public expects uniformed members of the Fire Department to know something about fire prevention work and to have an interest in this subject since they are public employees engaged in this field. Firefighters, therefore, during Fire Prevention Week, should have this subject uppermost in their minds and they should not pass a fire hazard at any time without making a note of it for reference to the Fire Prevention Division. In short, every uniformed man in the fire department is a fire prevention inspector at all times.

Company commanders, on receipt of the Fire Prevention posters, will post these items in a suitable location at the front of each fire station where they will be visible to the public. They will remain posted through October 9, 1993.

A list of all fire prevention activities and their locations will be forthcoming.

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II. HIGH COMMENDATION

On July 18, 1993, at 0345 hours, incident #25890, companies responded to ${\rm Box}$ 2311 (2 alarms) for a fire in a five story brick building at 460 commonwealth Avenue, District 5.

Fire Fighter William O'Sullivan of Ladder Company 26 ascended the aerial to the roof and commenced ventilation. Within moments, an occupant trapped by intense heat and smoke appeared at a top floor window, calling for assistance. Fire Fighter O'Sullivan had Ladder 26's aerial re-positioned to the fifth floor where he removed the occupant down the aerial to safety. Simultaneously, members of Ladder Company 15 were ordered to attempt an interior rescue. Fire Fighter O'Sullivan returned via the aerial to the roof and continued ventilation.

HIGH COMMENDATION CONTINUED

Pire Lieutenant Robert J. Crawford, Fire Fighters Michael T. Pass and Richard K. Callow of Ladder Company 15 proceeded to the fifth floor encountering extreme heat and a heavy smoke condition. Upon receiving notification of the rescued occupant, they vented the upper floor and started down the stairway. The increasing heat and smoke conditions forced them back to the fifth floor. Unable to locate another exit, and their air supply nearly exhausted, they proceeded onto the rear fire escape which was engulfed in heat and smoke.

Upon hearing calls for assistance from the members of Ladder Company 15, three righter O'Sullivan proceeded to the edge of the roof. Unable to see them, he removed his mask and passed it down through the smoke. He radioed a request for a ladder to the rear. With all members air supply nearly exhausted and because of the hazardous situation, including obstacles in raising a ladder at the rear, he laid prone on the roof with his upper torso over the edge, reached with his hand through the smoke and was able to pull each member from the top rail of the fire escape.

Because of his actions in rescuing the occupant, assisting and removing fellow members from a precarious position, therefore averting serious injury while at great personal risk, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter William O'Sullivan of Ladder Company 26 and refers his case to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

III. COMMENDATIONS

3. On November 26, 1993, Engine Company 48 and Ladder Company 28 responded to One Westinghouse Plaza, District 10, at 1126 hours, incident #42824. Upon arrival, members observed an elderly male trapped in the front passenger side of an automobile with arcing electrical wires and an assortment of other wires crossing over the windshield and hood. A transformer had punctured the roof, and while leaking severely, was saturating and pushing down on the person, preventing his escape. Boston Edison was summoned. A decision was made to remove the person immediately and in as safe a manner as possible.

All members of Engine Company 48 and Ladder Company 28 combined in the rescue effort. Some members used ropes and wooden rakes to secure the wires, others removed the windshield, cut the seat belt, covered the person to protect him from the spill, used a backboard in removal, and performed a medical survey, all actions performed prior to the arrival of other emergency personnel.
