

ISTORIC BOSTON INC. is pleased to be a part of the Dudley Square neighborhood. This vibrant community has a rich history and a strong future.

The **Eustis Street Fire House** was built in 1859 to house the fire engine known as Torrent Six. The building was home to the local

chapter of the Spanish American War Veterans from 1919 to 1950 and was used briefly by the city parks department. The unused structure fell into disrepair.








1 Eustis Street Fire House

20 Eustis Street, The oldest standing fire house in Boston is now home to HBI. The brick structure was built in 1859, to house the Torrent Six fire engine.

2 Palladio Hall

54 Warren Street, This building was designed and owned by Nathaniel J. Bradlee, a prominent Boston architect, and constructed by T.J. Whiddenin the 1870's, a well-respected builder of the time.

3 Hibernian Hall

184 Dudley Street, Built in 1913 as a dance and music hall. It was restored and reopened in 2005 by the Madison Park Development Corporation.

4 Nawn Factory

2080 Washington Street, This building was built in 1880 by Owen Nawn, a developer and contractor, who is know for his efforts to push industrial growth in the area of Roxbury and Jamaica Plain.

5 Kornfield Pharmacy Building

2121 Washington Street, This building was constructed in 1877-1878 by the noted Boston contractor J.W. Coburn, who built the Bunker Hill Monument. This, like six other buildings in Dudley Square, was designed to be an apartment hotel.

6 Ferdinand Building

Corner of Warren & Washington Streets, Built in 1895, this building was designed by John Lyman Faxon to house the Ferdinand's Blue Store.

7 Sargent Prince Building

37 Roxbury Street, This building was constructed in 1868, and subsequently owned by Boston's 23RD Mayor, Frederick Octavius Prince. The building was refurbished, and turned into affordable housing in one of the first efforts to bring back Dudley Square.

8 Eliot Burying Ground

Corner of Eustis & Washington Streets, This burial ground was established in 1630, and it is the oldest burial ground in Roxbury, and the third oldest in Boston.

9 Dartmouth Hotel

391 Dudley Street, This ornate Dudley landmark was built in 1871, and is a National Register building, designed by local architect John Roulstone Hall, who also designed the Eustis Street Fire House.
