SEVEN FIREMEN **GO TO HOSPITAL**

Affected by Smoke at Blaze on High St.

Fire in Premises Occupied by Kennev Bros & Wolkins.

Engine 25 Has to Draw From Other Companies.

It is some time since the members or the Fire Department have suffered so much from smoke as they did last evening, when a fire broke out on the top floor of the four-story brick building at 224 Congress st, occupied by Kenney noor or the rour-story orick building at 224 Congress st, occupied by Kenney Brothers & Wolkins, dealers in school supplies. Seven fremen were so serious-ly affected that they were removed to is an acced that they were removed to the Haymarket-sq Relief Hospital un-der the direction of Dr John A. Foley and many others were treated at the scene of the fire.

der the direction of Dr John A. Foley and many others were treated at the scene of the fire. Those taken to the hospital ware Dis-trict Chief Stephen J. Ryder of the Third District, who was acting deputy chief last evening owing to the absence of De-puty Chief Taber; Capt Allan J. Mao-Donald of Ladder 18, who was filling the post of district chief, and hosemen Mich-ael J. Griffin, Edward J. Coveney, Arthur L. Johnson and John F. Hardy of En-gine 25, Fort Hill sq, and senior ladder-man Theodore P. Galipeau of Ladder 5, Fort Hill sq. Hoseman Griffin, one of the first taken to the hospital, had a cut on the right wrist in addition to suf-fering from smoke. Patroiman George Seavey of the Court-seq Station saw the smoke coming from the upper floor of the structure and gave the alarm from box 1423 at 9:40. At that time Chief McDonough and several pleces of apparatus were finishing an attack on a Cross-st fire and they made the run over to Congress st quickly and soon a second alarm was given from box 1422. This acted as a third alarm, as the "all out" had not been received for the Cross-st fire. Chief MoDonough learned quickly that the fire would be a hard and dan-gerous one to fight, inasmuch as there was a hanging floor, heavily weighted down with desks, above the fourth floor of the structure. As the flames were burning briskly around the roof he feared that the support of the hang-ing floor was likely to be burned away and in that case the floor would drop and the lives of any firemen in the building would be imperilled.

Engine 25 Crew Suffers. However, Capt James F. Ryan of En-gine 25 and his crew rushed into the building before Chief McDonough ar-rived, and they cannot remember when have fought a fire under such difthey ficulties.

Out of the six men of Engine 25, in-cluding Capt Ryan, that entered the structure, the captain and hoseman Dathe vid Martell were the only ones that did not have to go to the hospital. These two were weak from inhaling smoke, but it did not affect them as seriously

as it did the others. Engine 25's cr Engine 25's crew, until smoke wrecked its personnel, fought the fire from a stairway. Engines 7, 18 and 39 were also in front of the structure, along with Aerial Ladder 18 and Water Tower 1. The latter machine, in charge the Eighth P

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of Lieut Charles H. Long, did effective work.

From High st engine companies car-

From High st engine companies car-ried lines to the roof of an adjoining building and around on Gridley st. to the rear of the building that was afire. Engine Companies 4 and 26 and Ladi-der Company ?s men took their hose lines over ladders that were raised against the rear of the structure, and from the roofs of buildings on the op-posite side of Gridley st the crews of Ladder Trucks 13 and 17 directed Streams. Tower 3 also worked from Gridley st. Gridley st.

Gridley st. The smoke was stifling in narrow Gridley st, and time and again the fire-inen were driven back. The flames were leaping over the edge of the roof, en-dangering the firemen. Dist Chief Coul-ter several times called his men back lest they might be injured. The fire was in that part of the struc-ture used as a finishing room and it was stocked heavily with desks. The firemen said that burning varnishes, shellacs and gas hampered them con-tinually and the wonder of it all was that some of them did not collapse on the ladders.

One Firm's Less \$25,000.

Kenney Bros & Wolkins occupy the three floors above the street. On the second floor are the offices and paper room, and the third floor the furniture room, and on the top the desk and finishing room. The memoers of the firm said they carried a heavy stock, as this is their busy season. They figured that the damage would amount to approxi-

The first floor of the building is occu-pied by Charles F. Wheelock & Co, deal-ers in bookbinders materials. There the damage will be from water only, but it may be heavy as the water came through from the upper floors in torrents.

Firemen guarded adjoining structures, as in them was much inflammable mate-rial and the flames constantly threat-ened to spread. On the top floor of the building at 228 Congress st large quan-tities of wool were stored. A fire door separated this material from the finish-ing room in the adjoining building,

Dr Foley of the Relief Hospital staff attended his first big fire officially last hight, and he will remember it for a long time. He did nut have an idle moment time. He did not have an idle moment for two hours.

Engine Company 35 was hit so hard by losses from the smoke that Chief Mc-Donough had to provide a special de-all of men who will serve on it pending the recovery of the men who were taken to the hospital. Late last night Chiefs Ryder and MacDonald were able to leave the hospital leave the hospital.
