To His Honor the Mayor and the City Council of the City of Boston:—

Gentlemen, — In compliance with the provisions of the City Ordinance, the Board of Fire Commissioners herewith

presents its Eighth Annual Report.

The personnel of the Board remains unchanged, Commissioner Edward A. White, whose term expired on the first Monday in May, being his own successor, having been renominated by the Mayor, and confirmed as Commissioner by the City Council for three years from the above date.

The permanent force has been increased by three, and the call force by fourteen, since the last annual report. On the 30th of July, 1880, a new Hook and Ladder company was organized, and located on Tremont st., near Cabot, for the purpose of affording additional protection to that section of the city and to the Back Bay, and supplied a want long felt in the localities mentioned.

#### Houses.

The houses of the department are in good condition, and extensive repairs have been made in the stables of many of the houses to save time in hitching. The stalls have been changed, and the horses put in a direct line with the apparatus. Among the houses changed during the last year were the following:—

#### IN THE CITY PROPER.

Hook and Ladder-house No. 8.— (Fort Hill Square.) The stalls in this house, which were at the extreme end of the apparatus-room, were brought forward to the wheel of the truck, thus giving the horses a short and straight run. The smoking-room has been enlarged by moving the partition to the rear some six feet, giving the company an opportunity to place and use a billiard table there.

Engine-house No. 6. — (Wall st.) The stalls in this house have been moved forward about four feet, in order to bring the horses nearer the pole. A new floor has been laid in the stable and in part new stalls made. The lower part of the house has been repainted, whitened, and grained.

Engine-house No. 22. — (Dartmouth st.) Extensive alterations are being made in this house. On the lower floor the stable accommodations have been improved by the addition of another stall. A room directly off the apparatus-room, formerly used as a stable, is being thoroughly fitted for a sleeping-room. A new hard-pine floor is being laid, the walls and ceilings to be painted and whitened, and new patent blinds put on the windows, and when completed will be the dormitory for eight men. A part of the old sleeping-room upstairs is to be fitted up for a hay-loft. A new manure-pit has also been made under the stable.

Engine and Hook and Ladder houses No. 3. — (Harrison ave., cor. Bristol st.) The stalls in each of these houses are being brought forward to each side of the apparatus, on the main

floor, and the old stable is being remodelled to accommodate the housing of the coal and supply wagons, three horses, and the horse and buggy used by the Superintendent of Fire Alarms.

A sliding pole has been placed in Engine-house No. 4, from the sleeping apartments to the floor, and saves much valuable time. It is the intention of the Board, after testing the utility of this plan, to apply it to the other houses where needed.

#### IN THE ROXBURY DISTRICT.

Engine-house No. 13. — (Cabot st.) The stalls, four in number, have been faced to the front and brought forward to the wheels of the apparatus. The whole lower part of the house has been painted and grained.

Engine-house No. 14. — (Centre st.) The stalls in this house have been brought forward to the hub of the wheels of the apparatus, giving the horses a short and straight run to the pole.

Hook and Ladder-house No. 4. — (Dudley st.) On the lower floor of this house three bunks have been placed, for the accommodation of members desiring to sleep in quarters, whereby the efficiency of the company is increased by the assistance rendered the driver in case of an alarm, he being

the only permanent man in quarters.

The establishment of an additional Ladder company in the · Highlands, and the necessity for additional fire protection in the vicinity of Mount Pleasant, necessitated a change of apparatus in the Roxbury District. That section of the city lying between Old Engine-house No. 12 (on the corner of Dudley and Winslow streets) and Engine-house No. 21, being one and one-half miles in length, is being rapidly covered with dwellings, and, in the opinion of the Board, needed additional fire protection. The Board, after due consideration, deemed it advisable to remove the quarters of Engine No. 12 to its present location on Mt. Pleasant, and transfer the quarters of Hook and Ladder No. 4 to where Engine No. 12 was formerly located. For this purpose the quarters of old Engine No. 12 were adapted to the use of a ladder truck, the stalls changed to face the pole of the truck, and other repairs made in this house. new quarters of Engine No. 12 were renovated, the stalls changed to the new plan, with swinging doors, etc. The Board thinks the change, while involving very little expense,

affords ample protection to all sections in that part of the city.

#### IN THE SOUTH BOSTON DISTRICT.

Hook and Ladder-house No. 5. — (Fourth st.) The stalls in this house have been faced to the front and brought forward nearer the pole.

#### IN THE EAST BOSTON DISTRICT.

The stalls in Engine-house No. 9 have been faced to the front, and the lower part of the house repainted. Two additional stalls have been put in Engine-house No. 11, for the accommodation of an extra horse for the new hose wagon.

#### IN THE DORCHESTER DISTRICT.

Engine-house No. 18. — The stalls in this house have been faced to the front and brought forward nearer the wheels of the apparatus. The stalls and lower part of the house

have been put in good condition.

In addition to the special communication sent by the Board to the City Council, recommending that a house be furnished on the Back Bay, for a chemical or steam fire-engine company, this Board would also call your attention to the necessity for establishing an additional steam fire-engine company in the Charlestown District. Charlestown now has one engine company and 4 hose companies, but if a fire occurred in certain localities, the hydrant pressure is so low that hose companies would be of little use. If this Board were furnished by the City Council with an engine-house, one of the hose companies could be changed to an engine company, and the whole done without entailing a great deal of expense. The hose-house near the locality needing a steam fire engine is too small to meet the want.

## APPARATUS AND APPARATUS REPAIR SHOP.

The large amount of money saved to the city in the repair of apparatus by the establishment of this shop, and that for the repair of hose and harness, is a sufficient justification for its establishment and continuance by the commissioners. The work is there done expeditiously and well, and at first cost. In it are employed eleven machinists, blacksmiths,

wheelwrights, etc., and from three to five detailed men from the department. On several pieces of apparatus extensive repairs have been made.

The following statement shows some of the important

The new apparatus purchased during the year were one

buggy, for the use of the commissioners, two wagons, a steam fire-engine of the Silsby pattern, and a hook and ladder truck fully equipped.

Three of the ladder trucks in the city proper have been supplied with a calcium-light apparatus, which has proved very useful on more than one occasion since its introduction.

The necessity for a new apparatus repair shop is so apparent that the City Council has recently set apart 8,000 feet of land at the junction of Albany and Bristol streets, on which to build a new and more commodious structure. This Board respectfully urges upon your honorable body the necessity of a building on this site as soon as possible, in view of the great saving to the city by the establishment of this shop.

#### APPARATUS REPAIR SHOP.

The following table shows the number of pieces of apparatus in use each year, during the last seven years, since the establishment of this Board, and the seven years preceding the same, together with the cost of repairs for each year. From these figures it will be seen that while the apparatus in actual use has more than doubled during the past seven years the cost of keeping the same in repair is 60 per cent. less.

# Hose and Harness.

Since the date of the last report the swinging harness has been introduced in nearly all the permanent houses of the department, and gives much satisfaction. It saves time in hitching, saves harness, and is a great relief to the horses. In a short time the whole department will be supplied with the harness. The work is done at the harness-shop, as well as the making and repairing of harness and hose.

The number of horses in the department is 146, and, with few exceptions, they are in good condition. A hospital for sick horses is in Hose No. 7's house, where they are attended by George W. Stimpson, a member of the department, who is an excellent veterinary surgeon, and to whom, under the Chief, is confided the inspection and care of the horses of the department. During the year 1 horse has died, 4 have been exchanged, and 14 purchased.

In addition to the above there stands to the credit of the department one horse exchanged in part payment for a new horse, which, failing to give satisfaction, was returned to the

owner.

## WATER AND HYDRANTS.

During the past year additional hydrants have been added, viz., Lowry, 16; Post, 54; Boston, 26; and Boston Lowry, 64, making a total of hydrants for supplying water in case of fire 4,834. In addition to these hydrants there are 216 fire reservoirs located in different sections of the city, capable of

holding from 300 to 500 hogsheads of water. In its last report this Board called the attention of the City Council to the large tax charged by the water department for each hydrant and reservoir located in the city, viz., \$30 per hydrant and reservoir. This tax had increased from \$59,730 in 1872 to \$128,940 in 1880, — an amount altogether out of proportion to the cost of the water used or the price paid by private consumers. A special committee was appointed by the City Council to look into the matter, and the result was that the Water Department has reduced its tax from \$30 to \$20 per hydrant and reservoir, making a total reduction in the water tax chargeable to the department of about \$45,000. This Board contends that even this amount is not a sufficient reduction, and that, with the necessary increase of hydrants throughout the city, from year to year, the tax must be still further reduced at no distant day. If this department were taxed for the actual amount of water used at fires, at the rate of 2 cents per 100 gallons, — the rate paid by private individuals. - \$3,000 would be more than sufficient to pay the total cost.

#### FIRE-ALARM TELEGRAPH.

Early in the year work was commenced at head-quarters in making improvements in the apparatus and arrangement of the battery and circuit wires. New and substantial structures were placed on the roof of the City Hall for the purpose of carrying the wires. These are of sufficient height to allow no wires belonging to other companies to pass above those of the fire-alarm department, and this has been accomplished in all the work of reconstruction during the year.

The interior wires, leading to the operating room, have been renewed and run in a systematic way, by which each may be traced its entire length, and an entirely new arrangement of the batteries has been made, affording more room

and better facilities for inspection and repairs.

A supplementary local circuit has been established, by which alarms are indicated by vibrators placed in the sleeping apartments, giving the signals to the employés occupying them through the night at the same time that they are recorded by the register in the operating room. This is intended to cover the contingency of the operator on duty being suddenly incapacitated by illness from performing his part in giving the alarm to the public after it has been received. The old circuit call bells have been removed, and a new annunciator substituted for them, by which any call or alarm can be more quickly or certainly located than before,

removing all chance for delay in adjusting the apparatus

which previously existed.

A new eighteen-pen, ink-marking register has been substituted for the old ten-pen one, which had been in use for so many years, and the office has been equipped with new apparatus throughout, with the exception of the striking-machine and switch-board. It is intended to provide a glass case for the striking-machine, the better to exclude dust and moisture, and a new switch-board of enlarged dimensions and more modern design. A set of galvanometers, of uniform design and resistance, have been placed in an isolated position to remove them from local influence, and a full set of relays and keys has been obtained to replace the old instruments. All the new work in the office has been done on the basis of eighteen circuits, giving a surplus of four circuits for future need.

Renewal and reconstruction of the circuits have been carried on through the year, and in all cases where new work has been done substantial structures have been erected of sufficient height to carry the wires above all others, obviating to a great extent the troubles from grounds and crosses which prevailed at the commencement of the year.

The wires have been renewed running south from the City Hall to the bridges, forming a part of the South Boston and Dorchester circuits, and these with the dial circuit are

new through the "Burnt District."

The south-west and north-west circuits have been placed on new structures for a short distance.

The south-east is rebuilt on the left side to East street.

New wires have been run from the City Hall to Charlestown and East Boston for the alarm and dial circuits, also the wires for the new circuit which is being built in East Boston the present season. The north-east circuit is now being reconstructed throughout.

The two Roxbury circuits have been partially rebuilt, the east as far as Common street on its right side, and on the left to the house of Engine 24, and the west to Common street on the left, and Tremont Temple on the right. Over 40 miles of new wire have been laid during the year.

A new seven-wired cable has been laid across the Chelsea-bridge draw, and an old one taken from Mt. Washington ave. bridge was laid at the Meridian-st. bridge draw for the East

Boston alarm and dial circuits.

The telephone company has kindly allowed this department to lay wires on its structures wherever erected in the city. The keyless door is now on trial in connection with our fire-alarm boxes, and so far has given satisfaction. In Chicago, where this door is used very extensively, it has proved a success. It saves time in hunting up keys, and facilitates the giving of an alarm, for it can be opened by any person by simply turning a handle. The problem of how to carry on telegraph and telephone business, which is continually increasing, without the aid of the unsightly poles that disfigure our streets, is occupying the attention of persons interested in electric science. Several plans are presented to the public, but they are practically the overground and underground plan; but no plan yet has been put to such a practical test as to justify this Board in recommending its adoption at present.

In the matter of giving an alarm of fire, when the delay of minutes or a failure might involve the destruction of millions, it would be unwise to give up that which is known to be safe and economical, under ordinary circumstances, for a system which has never been applied to the fire-alarm telegraph, until at least a series of experiments are made, and its prac-

ticability absolutely tested.

The Board has under consideration this matter through an order from the Board of Aldermen. The cost of the proposed change, if deemed advisable, will involve a large expenditure, which might be lessened if done in connection with telegraph or telephone companies. If any organized company hereafter obtain permission to lay wires underground or by an overground system, the city should exact for the privilege the right to lay its wires without fee, or for a small sum. Several companies are on the eve of organization, and will ask permission to lay their patent appliances either under or over and along the streets of the city for the purpose of carrying telegraph and telephone wires, and this right of free transit should be secured to the city as one of the conditions of granting any license to parties who apply.

The burning of the upper portion of the City Hall, in which is located the fire-alarm office, is one of the possibilities, and there is no structure in this city in which fire can so rapidly

travel as in this upper section of the hall. To meet this possible danger batteries of from 60 to 90 cups each have been placed in East Boston, Burnt District, and South Boston, everything being in readiness so that the alarm can be given in the houses on the tappers. It is intended to extend this system to the South End, Roxbury, and Dorchester Districts. In the opinion of the Board the present location of the fire-alarm office is a very dangerous one, and some isolated building should be selected in which to locate this branch of the fire service, where it will be less liable to exposure in case of fire, for upon it depends the prompt and efficient work of our whole department; when it ceases to work the department becomes paralyzed.

Appended is a comparative statement of the cost of maintaining the fire-alarm telegraph for the past seven years, since the establishment of the Board of Fire Commissioners, and for the seven years preceding, together with the number of fire-alarm boxes established each year, and the miles of

wire maintained.

The largest loss by any one fire was that in the clothing establishment of Messrs. Whitten, Burdett & Young and others, \$470,125, on the morning of May 6, 1880. This loss is more than one-third of the loss for the whole year, viz.:—

It will be seen by the first table that the aggregate losses on buildings are sixty per cent. less than on the contents of the same, and that while the building loss may be very small, as in the case of Messrs. Whitten, Burdett & Young, the loss on that which the building contains may be

very great.

The building laws in operation for the past eight years, and the appointment of competent inspectors to enforce the same, are a great improvement on former systems, on what might be termed "the build-as-you-please" style of combustible architecture. By this method many blocks of houses in the dwelling localities of the city have been constructed, and in such a manner as to insure communication by fire from one dwelling to another in the shortest space of time. If the architects and builders who constructed these blocks designedly erected them for the purpose of rapid destruction by fire, they could not have succeeded better, for while they have provided hollow spaces behind furrings and floors and under roofs, by which fire can travel from basement to attic, and thence, by the concealed spaces in the roof, from house to house in a block, they have admirably protected the fire from the water of the steam fire-engine. And this style of building is by no means confined to the poorer or middling class of houses in the city. It is to be found in Beacon street equally with the wooden blocks in East or South On the night of Oct. 22, 1880, a fire occurred in the basement kitchen of No. 188 Beacon street, and though a large amount of money was spent packing the space between the floor and the under ceiling of each story, yet fire worked its way behind the furring in the wall and up to the attic. If one story were cut off from another behind the furring, by the application of a little brick and mortar or lathing, and at small expense, the damage would have been nominal instead of \$6,421.

Since the great fire in 1872 all the buildings in the burnt district have been built, and though they have not all the defects

mentioned, they have others that are equally disastrous in case of fire, and which are beyond the reach of building laws, but which owners and architects can remedy, if they will, and at very little cost. The bulk of our fire loss is in the business section of the city, and is occasioned by defects in the internal construction of the buildings, by which fire and smoke can communicate from the first to the sixth story through every floor, and occasion a loss of hundreds of thousands on the contents, though the loss on the building itself may be very small. In many of the large buildings in the "burnt district" there are as many kinds of business carried on as there are stories in the building, each story being under the control of a different occupant. These floors, instead of being separated from each other as much as possible, are usually connected by elevator shafts, without automatic hatches or other appliances to cut off communication, and by wooden stairways and glass doors and windows at the head of each stairway, all excellent conductors of flame and smoke, and calculated to produce the largest amount of loss in case of fire. A little additional expense, the use of a little more sheet-tin around elevators and doors,—the expense a mere trifle, — would save thousands yearly in this city and State. The estimated losses by fire in the whole State during the past year aggregate \$4,454,221, and one quarter of the above loss occurred in this city. In no other part of the civilized world is so much of the capital of the country destroyed through fire as in the United States, the amount averaging each year \$75,000,000; and all this, notwithstanding the fact that in no countries are its large cities so well supplied with fire apparatus, men, and waterhydrants, to fight fire, as in the United States. If Boston, New York, or Chicago, had only the facilities which the large cities of London or Paris have to combat fire, the loss here would be enormous. The difference in loss is due to the methods of building in vogue here and in European cities. Carelessness in construction, carelessness in the supervision of goods stored in buildings, and over-insurance, are the fruitful seeds of large conflagrations.

Of the whole number of fires during the year in this State 40 per cent. are reported as incendiary or unknown. This city during the past year has been visited by many serious incendiary fires, especially in lumber-yards, and all efforts to detect the perpetrators have thus far proved unavailing. Many of these fires have been discovered in season, and before much damage was done, the places selected being stores in "the burnt district." Broken panes in basement windows, in our large warehouses, afford ample facilities for the incendiary to

perform his work; and owners or occupants should see that these basement windows are in good condition, especially during the night. If every fire in this city could be investigated by some person authorized to act, and empowered to send for persons and papers, and take evidence in the nature of a fire inquest when necessary; if the result of those inquests was published, and the origin, cause, and course of each fire given to the public, the official exposure of these faulty methods of construction, which make fires so disastrous, would bring about a reform in the building of warehouses, dwellings, etc., in the city, more effectually than even the building laws, because it would tend to remedy through public opinion that which the building laws cannot reach. Last year the City Council petitioned for authority to create the office of Fire Marshal, whose duty it should be to make investigation as to the origin of all fires in this city; but the act failed, principally because of a disagreement between the representatives of the insurance companies and the city as to how this officer should be paid, whether by the city or the insurance companies. A more expeditious method than the roundabout way now prescribed by statute for a fire inquest

Appended are given the losses and insurances on property, with the number of fire alarms since the year 1829, covering a period of fifty-one years. In this connection it is proper to state that the only correct report of the losses by fire in the subjoined table is that given since the establishment of the Board of Fire Commissioners. The reports of losses preceding the years 1873-4 are but approximate, and fall far short of the actual loss sustained. In many cases of fire, where second and third alarms were given, no return of loss appears in the reports, and few losses under the head of still alarms. Since the establishment of this Commission the loss by every fire, with the insurance on the same, is obtained as accurately as possible. The department responded to a larger number of fires during the past year than any preceding year, the number being 731.

The difference between the losses and the amount of insurance on property during the past seven years as compared with the preceding years is noticeable; in nearly all cases the insurance reported being less than the amount of property destroyed.

#### Pensions of Disabled Firemen.

This Board would again call the attention of the City Council to the necessity for setting apart some amount to help pension disabled and aged firemen. Last year the Legislature passed an act enabling the city to pension disabled firemen, or the widows and children of men killed in the discharge of their duty. The Mayor and Board of Fire Commissioners have also been made a body corporate to receive moneys, etc., in trust, for the purpose of aiding firemen or their families receiving assistance. This corporation has already entrusted to it the sum of \$17,958, of which \$16,000 are invested in bonds of the City of Boston. During the past year the sum of \$3,482.27 has been distributed among our sick firemen temporarily incapacitated from performing duty. This money has been principally obtained from the proceeds of the Firemen's Annual Ball, though several generous donations have been received; among them, \$500 each from Messrs. Whitten, Burdett & Young, the Misses Wigglesworth, and the firm of Nash, Spaulding & Co.

#### Police.

At all our large fires the police are invaluable in aiding this department by their promptness and efficiency in keeping the streets clear in the vicinity of fires, and thus enabling the Fire Department to work without obstruction.

#### PROTECTIVE DEPARTMENT.

The protective department is a valuable and indispensable corps of men, and a necessary adjunct to all fire departments, especially in large cities. Their prompt work saves much valuable property from destruction by water. They are paid by the insurance companies.

### FIRE DISTRICTS.

The city is divided into Ten Fire Districts, as follows:—
DISTRICT 1.—Comprises all that part of Boston known as
East Boston.

DISTRICT 2. — All that part of Boston formerly known as Charlestown.

District 3. — All that part east of a line beginning at the Charles-river drawbridge, and running through the centre of Charlestown street, Haymarket square, and Washington to Summer street, and north of Summer street and the N.Y. and N.E. R.R. passenger depot to the water.

District 4. — All that part west of District 3, and north of a line running through the centre of Winter and Park streets, and west of Beacon, to Otter and north of Otter street to the water.

DISTRICT 5. — All that part south of Districts 3 and 4 to the centre of Dover-street drawbridge, and a line running through the centre of Dover, Berkeley, Boylston, Arlington, Beacon, and Otter street to the water.

- District 6. All that part of Boston known as South Boston.
- District 7. All that part of Boston south of District 5, to the centre of Albany-street drawbridge; thence through the centre of Albany, Northampton street, Columbus avenue, and Chester Park, to Charles river.
- District 8.—All that part south and west of District 7, to the boundary line of West Roxbury, and West of Washington street to the Brookline boundary line, and including all of Ward 25, formerly Brighton.
- DISTRICT 9. All that part south of Districts 6 and 7, to
  West Roxbury line, running through the
  centre of Blue Hill avenue, Columbia,
  Green, Bowdoin, Church, and Commercial
  streets, to Dorchester avenue, thence due
  east to the water.
- Districts 8 and 9, including West Roxbury.

### Pungs.

There are 40 pungs in use by the department, — 36 for carrying hose, 2 for jobbing, and 2 for Fire-Alarm Department.

The Engines, Hose, Hats, Axes, Ladders, and all the other apparatus used by the Fire Department, are owned by the city, and are under the care and control of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

### COAL HOUSES.

No. 1 is located on Salem street. This house is in good repair, and supplies for the north and west sections of the city are taken from it in case of a large fire.

No. 2 is located in Hose-house No. 3, Charlestown.

No. 3 is located on Orleans street, East Boston. From this house, in case of fire, supplies are taken for the East Boston Department.

No. 4. Coal depot at 18 and 20 Mt. Washington ave.

### SUPPLY WAGONS.

No 1. Kept at Engine-house No. 26, Mason street; used as a coal wagon.

No. 2. Kept at house of H. & L. Co. No. 3, Harrison
