#### SPECIAL COMMENTS

1. Fires

During 1960 there were 2,096 fires in buildings, which is a decrease from the number of fires that occurred during 1959. There has been a steady decrease in the number of building fires over the past six years.

2. Space Heaters (Oil Burners)

As the result of extensive research and tests conducted by the department at our laboratories on Moon Island in connection with space heaters, it is with great satisfaction that we can report no loss of life during the satisfaction that we can report no loss of life during the latter part of 1960 because of fire or explosion in space heaters. In accordance with information obtained from these tests, the Underwriters Laboratories will no longer put their seal of approval on any barometric feed-type space heater which, over a period of years, should result in their no longer being used in this area.

It was learned from our tests that two important precautions should always be taken before lighting space heaters: (a) Always fill the container to the brim, and (b) never use chilled oil. A city-wide publicity campaign was conducted concerning these two precautions, and 200,000 circulars giving information concerning the use of space heaters were distributed throughout the school

system.

3. In-Service Inspections

In-service inspections were carried out during the year 1960 from April 1 to October 30. It is believed that these inspections, together with the inspection work performed by members of the Fire Prevention Division, have had an important bearing in reducing the number of building fires in the city.

4. New Fire Station

On June 11, 1960, a new fire station at Tremont and West Concord streets, to house Engine 22 and Ladder 13, was opened and occupied by those companies.

#### 5. Fire Stations Closed

On the same day the old fire station at 72 Warren avenue, Boston, was closed, as was also the fire station at 1046 Tremont street, Roxbury, which formerly housed

Engine Company 13 and Ladder Company 12. Ladder Company 12 was disbanded, and Engine Company 13 was relocated in the quarters of Ladder Company 23 at 36 Washington street, Dorchester.

Engine Squad 18 moved from the fire station at 30 Harvard street, Dorchester, to the former quarters of Engine Company 46 (disbanded) at 1884 Dorchester avenue, Dorchester. Engine House 18 is no longer used for Fire Department purposes.

#### 6. Underwater Recovery Team

Under the direction of Chief of Department John A. Martin an underwater recovery team was formed, composed of fire fighters who have completed professional training and who have received certificates as qualified skin divers. The team, which consists of eleven members, rendered valuable service in recovering bodies from an airliner which crashed in Boston Harbor on October 7, 1960.

### 7. Fire Training Academy

The Fire Training Academy located on Moon Island, Boston Harbor, Quincy, Massachusetts, was completed during the year. Dedication ceremonies took place on November 3, 1960, but prior to that time it was used for training activities.

Training has been universally recognized as a prime

Training has been universally recognized as a prime requisite in all fields of endeavor, and a consideration of job efficiency emphasizes this point. Certainly there is no field of endeavor more important than one concerned with the protection of life and property. Therefore considerable effort has been expended in this area

by the department.

Weather conditions necessitate the separation of training activities into two phases — the cold weather phase and the temperate weather phase. Outside training programs are curtailed during periods of low temperatures. This provides an opportunity to utilize training personnel for inside programs consisting of: a close review of methods and procedures; surveys of the condition of equipment and appliances and the efficiency of personnel in their operational use; film programs covering particular fire-fighting and rescue problems; the conduct of classes covering automatic sprinkler systems, fire alarm and detection systems, utility gas and

electric installations, and hydrant installations. This latter was accomplished through the use of the many cut-away and working models of such units which had been donated and installed in our new Fire Academy by

public-spirited individuals and firms.

During periods of moderate temperatures, initially the old Navy Fire School, and, upon its completion, the new Training Academy were used for: (1) review training in various fireground evolutions; (2) the indoctrination of personnel in new operational procedures; (3) surveys and evaluations of methods and equipment, including items of new equipment developed for the fire service. The various fire companies were assigned to the training area for unit drilling a sufficient number of times so that all company personnel could actively participate and engage in the programs in progress. This method of scheduling company training permits the maintenance of "team work" so essential in successful fireground operations.

In the past year many requests were received for training of personnel other than members of this department. The Armed Forces, various governmental agencies, hospitals, schools, industrial and business concerns were allowed to participate in training programs covering various phases of basic fire safety, operational use of fire-fighting and rescue equipment, and emergency rescue procedures. Instructional courses were developed and conducted in accordance with specific

NOTE

The first electric telegraph system for fire alarm in the world (in Boston) cost \$16,000 and consisted of 40 miles of wire, 45 signal boxes, or stations, and 16 alarm bells.

The system was officially accepted by the City of Boston at noon, April 28, 1852, and the first alarm was received from Station 7, District 1 (now Box 1212), at 8.25 r.M., April 29, 1852.

Total box alarms transmitted since April 28, 1852, through December 31, 1960, 460,864.


