#### SPECIAL COMMENTS

#### 1. Fire Prevention

During the year 1963 this department was awarded a plaque by the National Fire Protection Association for placing first in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; third in municipalities of over 500,000 in the United States; and sixth among all cities in the nation in a National Fire Prevention Contest held during 1963.

In-service inspections were carried out on a daily basis, weather permitting, April 1 to October 30. All fire companies in the city inspected various types of buildings in their subdistrict areas for the purpose of remedying any hazardous conditions which might be found, and also to become acquainted with the peculiarities of various occupancies so that more efficient fire-ground procedures could be employed in the event of fire in these areas. The fire-fighting force made 86,520 inspections during the foregoing period.

Every hotel in the city has been thoroughly inspected by members of this department during the past year. To further safety in hotels, the Fire Prevention Division has engaged in tests of various materials found in such occupancies, such as vinyl wall covering, acrylic rugs, flameproofed bed sheets, so-called fire-resistive mattresses, and similar materials. Legislation particularly applicable to watchman's service and fire alarm systems in hotels has been proposed, and public hearings have already been held before the Committee on Public Safety of the Massachusetts Legislature.

As part of our inspection program for hospitals and rest homes, numerous samples of wall, ceiling, and floor materials were obtained from these institutions and tested by our department chemist. The results of these tests lead to the removal of many flammable items from these institutions.

During the year 1963 there were fewer building fires in the city than occurred in the previous year.

#### 2. Fire Stations

A contract was awarded during the latter part of 1963 for the erection and completion of a new fire

station on Cambridge Street between Joy and South Russell Streets, Boston, to replace the Bowdoin Square fire station which was razed in November of that year to make way for the new state office building being erected by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The new station will house one engine company, one ladder company, and a district fire chief.

The program of remodeling some of our older fire stations, which began in 1962, has been continued during 1963, and contracts were awarded for making major alterations and repairs to the following fire stations:

Engine 13, Ladder 23—36 Washington Street, Dorchester

Engine 42, Ladder 30—1870 Columbus Avenue,

The alterations, when completed, will afford better and safer living conditions for the fire fighters quartered therein.

#### 3. Training Division

Twenty-six new fire fighters were appointed to the department on September 4, 1963, and were given seven weeks of intensive training and drilling in basic procedures at fires, including engine and ladder company operations, use of special equipment, first aid, rescue work, and handling of radioactive materials. The importance of training fire fighters in all phases of their duties and the necessity of equipping them with knowledge which will enable them to overcome the hazards which they continually face cannot be overemphasized. The individual efficiency of a fire officer, or fire fighter, in his assigned task is the determining factor in the success of fire-fighting operations. These operations require teamwork, and, if a member of a team is not familiar with his assignment, the entire operation will be affected adversely.

Each year the division conducts periodic surveys related to fire protection and fire-fighting equipment in order to insure that the equipment will function properly if its use is required. The survey also includes lifesaving equipment of various types.

#### 4. Alarms

During the year the department responded to a total of 27,843 box and still alarms, the largest number of responses in the history of the Boston Fire Department.

The first electric telegraph system for fire alarm in the world (in Boston) cost \$16,000 and consisted of 40 miles of wire, 45 signal boxes, or stations, and 16 slarm bells.

The system was officially accepted by the City of Boston at noon, April 28, 1852, and the first slarm was received from Station 7, District 1 (now Box 1212), at \$.25 p.m., April 29, 1852.

Total box alarms transmitted since April 28, 1852, through December 31, 1963, 506,029.


