#### SPECIAL COMMENTS

#### 1. Fires

During the year 1964 there were 2,216 fires in buildings. Boston experienced one large loss fire of conflagration proportions in the Dorchester section of the City. Seventeen dwelling houses were totally destroyed and numerous others were severely damaged during the

#### 2. Fire Prevention

During the year 1964 the department was awarded a plaque by the National Fire Protection Association for placing first in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, third among municipalities of over 500,000 in the United States, and ninth among all cities in the nation in a National Fire Protection Contest held during the year

During 1964 In-Service Inspections were carried on from April 1 to October 30, on a daily basis, weather permitting. A total of 72,878 inspections were made during this period of dwelling houses, apartment buildings, office buildings, warehouses, industrial and manufacturing plants. Other inspections were made of schools, churches, hospitals, nursing homes, theaters and other places of public assembly.

Approximately 1,000 individual items were tested by the Fire Department chemist for fire retarding properties. These items included wall covering, drapery and upholstery material, ceiling tiles, and a variety of sea-

sonal decorations.

During the past year there were 345 fires of undetermined origin. As the result of investigation of these fires, 38 cases were brought into Municipal Court and 21 convictions were obtained. Six cases of arson were tried in the Superior Court of Suffolk County and four convictions were obtained.

A research program is under way to determine the cause of grease flue fires in restaurants and to establish design and installation standards to abate this prevalent cause of fire. The cost of test installations is being borne by interested segments of the metal working and

restaurant industries, and the actual tests are being conducted and observed at the John A. Martin Training Academy.

The department sponsored and supported legislation which was passed with reference to the reporting of fires, control of flammable decorations, and the utilization of watchmen in hotels.

#### 3. Fire Stations

In March of 1964 construction was begun on a new fire station at 200 Cambridge Street, between Joy and South Russell Streets, Boston. When completed, the new station will house Engine Co. 4, Ladder Co. 24, and the District Fire Chief of District 3.

A contract was awarded during 1964 for making extensive alterations to the fire station housing Engine Co. 30 and Ladder Co. 25 at 1940 Centre Street, West Roxbury. The alteration work will prolong the life of this fire station which was built in 1898 and will also provide better living quarters for the men stationed therein.

### 4. Training Division

Thirty-six new fire fighters were appointed to the department, eleven on May 20, 1964, and twenty-five on September 9, 1964, and were given seven weeks of intensive training and drilling in basic procedures at fires, including engine and ladder company operations, use of special equipment, first aid, rescue work, and the handling of radioactive materials.

#### 5. Alarms

Response to alarms has greatly increased since 1959 when there were 19,174 alarms. During the year 1964 the department responded to a total of 28,246 alarms, 167 of which were mutual aid responses to adjacent cities and towns.

#### 6. Fire Apparatus

During the year 1964 the following fire-fighting equipment was received and placed in operation:

NOTE
The first electric telegraph system for Fire Alarm in the world (in Boston) cost \$16,000.00 and consisted of forty (40) miles of wire, forty-rive (45) signal boxes, or stations, and sixteen (16) alarm bells.

The system was officially accepted by the City of Boston at noon, April 28, 1852, and the first alarm was received from Station 7, District 1 (now Box 1212) at 8-25 P.M., April 29, 1852.

Total box alarms transmitted since April 28, 1852, through December 31, 1964, 523,783.
