### I. FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

£39

- 1. In recognition of the Proclamation of the President of the United States and the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Fire Prevention Week will be observed in the City of Boston from October 8 to 14 inclusive.
- 2. An organized campaign to emphasize the importance of fire prevention is being undertaken by the Boston Fire Department, by means of a series of activities, concentrated into the Fire Prevention Week period.
- of 12 Noon and 9 PM for inspection of the premises and for the conveyance of information concerning fire department functions and fire prevention matters. When citizens come to a station during Fire Prevention Week, the man on house patrol shall summons the commanding officer who should be available and ready to either show the visitors around the quarters and to answer questions regarding the department, or to have a suitable person assigned to this duty.
- 4. Children under 12 years of age should not be allowed in the fire stations unless accompanied by adults.
- 5. Canvas signs giving notice that Fire Prevention Week is in progress should be displayed from fire stations. Most stations have these signs in their possession from exhibitions of previous years and it is the responsibility of company officers to see to it that these signs are kept in good condition from year to year. Signs should be displayed from Sunday to Saturday.
- 6. District Chiefs are required to take an active interest in the fire prevention program in the following manner:
  - (A) By arranging special visits to plants and large industrial premises in their districts during the week and arranging to have a special fire drill held during Fire Prevention Week, particularly where there are now fire brigades already existing. Notices of the date of the fire drill held and the rating of the drill as either "Fair", "Poor" or "Good", should be forwarded to the Fire Prevention Division so that a summary may be made of the number and location of industrial fire drills conducted in the City of Boston during Fire Prevention Week, on each day of the week.
  - (B) All public and private schools within each District should be visited by a District Chief or such officers as may be detailed by the District Chief to assist in this work. School fire drills are to be held and permission should be obtained for the presentation of a five-minute talk on the subject of fire and fire prevention at an assembly of the pupils. Such talks should not be read from any manuscript or printed pamphlet, but should be delivered directly by the District Chief or by some uniformed member of the Fire Department capable of presenting such a talk effectively and promptly.

- (C) Home inspection blanks should be provided to various school principals or head masters for distribution and collection by the Teacher-Fire Councillor of the building. Collection of the filled-out home inspection blanks from Teacher-Councillors by the Fire Department is an important feature of the use of these forms and should not be neglected. A list of the schools from which such forms have been collected should be forwarded to the Fire Prevention Division on or before October 24th.
- (D) Officers assigned by the District Chief to deliver addresses in schools likewise should be assigned to attned Rotary Clubs, Kiwanis, Board of Trade and other neighborhood and local organization functions, including women's club meetings in the district held during the week or if no meeting is scheduled during the week to attend any meeting held during the month of October. Chief officers should know the various representative social organizations in the community and should keep a list of them for reference at such times when fire prevention messages of importance to the community are to be conveyed to such organizations quickly.
- 7. Throughout the week all firemen are to pay special attention to the observance of fire hazards and to the duty of observing and locating fire hazards along the route followed by them in their coming to and going from daily work. Dilapidated buildings, rubbish accumulations, and other hazards should be reported to the Fire Prevention Division. The public expects uniformed members of the Fire Department to know something about fire prevention work and to have an interest in this subject, since they are public employees engaged in this field. Firemen, therefore, during Fire Prevention Week, should have this subject uppermost in their minds and they should not pass by any fire hazard at any time without making a note of it for reference to the Fire Prevention Division. In short, every uniformed man in the Fire Department is a fire prevention inspector at all times.
- 8. An extensive program of radio broadcasts, news releases, store window displays, public exhibitions, has been arranged for Fire Prevention Week, notice of which will appear through the usual channels.
