Three upright tubular boilers, 100-horse power.

Two dynamos for lighting and fire alarm, one tire upsetter in the blacksmith shop, one No. 2 Blake pump in the hose and harness shop

for testing hose.

## BOSTON FIREMEN'S RELIEF FUND.

By chapter 107 of the Acts of 1880, the Mayor of the city of Boston for the time being (and his successors in office), the Fire Commissioner of the city of Boston for the time being (and his successors in office), were constituted a body corporate for the purpose of receiving and holding all sums of money, and real and personal estate, not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred thousand dollars, which may be given, granted, bequeathed, or devised to it for the benefit of members of the Boston Fire Department, or their families, requiring assistance, or for the benefit of any persons, or the families of any persons, who have been such members, requiring assistance. The property so held shall be known as the Boston Firemen's Relief Fund. The said body corporate shall have authority to manage and dispose of the same and the income thereof according to their best discretion, subject to the provisions of thereof according to their best discretion, subject to the provisions of any and all trusts which may be created for the purposes aforesaid.

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing act, the following-named persons, viz.: the Mayor, Thomas N. Hart; Fire Commissioner, Henry S. Russell—now constitute the Board of Trustees; Thomas N. Hart, Mayor, President; Henry S. Russell, Treasurer; Michael J.

Lafferty, Secretary.
