Hydrants. — For supplying water in case of fire there are 7,837 public and 291 private hydrants, viz.: In the City proper 1,476, in South Boston 597, in East Boston 429, in Roxbury 1,317, in Dorchester 1,926, in West Roxbury 1,155, in Brighton 603, in Charlestown 334. There are also 48 hydrants in addition to the above, located as follows: On Deer Island 20, on Long Island 7, on Thompson's Island 2, on Gallop's Island 2, on Rainsford Island 5, Quincy 12, Brookline 2. The public hydrants are located at a distance of 250 to 300 feet from each other.

#### BOSTON FIREMEN'S RELIEF FUND.

By Chapter 107 of the Acts of 1880, the Mayor of the City of Boston for the time being (and his successors in office), the Fire Commissioner of the City of Boston for the time being (and his successors in office), were constituted a body corporate for the purpose of receiving and holding all sums of money, and real and personal estate, not exceeding in the aggregate two hundred thousand dollars (amended to four hundred thousand dollars, by Chapter 170 of the Acts of 1906), which may be given, granted, bequeathed, or devised to it for the benefit of members of the Boston Fire Department, or their families, requiring assistances of the Boston Fire Department, or their families, requiring assistances. ance, or for the benefit of any persons, or the families of any persons, who have been such members, requiring assistance. The property so held shall be known as the Boston Firemen's Relief Fund. The said body corporate shall have authority to manage and dispose of the same and the income thereof according to their best discretion, subject to the provisions of any and all trusts which may be created for the purposes aforesaid.

In accordance with the provisions of the foregoing acts, the following named persons, viz., the Mayor, George A. Hibbard, and Fire Commissioner Samuel D. Parker, now constitute the Board of Trustees; George A. Hibbard, Mayor, President; Samuel D. Parker, Treasurer; Michael J. Lafferty, Secretary.

#### FITZGERALD FIREMEN'S GOLD MEDAL FUND.

Bequest of John E. FITZGERALD, the income to be collected by the City Treasurer and paid annually to the Fire Commissioner, to be used yearly in buying a gold medal to be presented to the fireman who, in the judgment of the Fire Commissioner, had performed the most meritorious act, and whose conduct has called for special mention.

Invested in one registered certificate of indebtedness of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, due January 1, 1941, interest at Three per cent. per annum
