TRUST FUNDS.

BOSTON FIREMEN'S RELIEF FUND.

By chapter 308 of the Acts of 1909 the Fire Commissioner of the City of Boston for the time being and his successors in office, and twelve members of the Fire Department of the City of Boston, to be chosen as hereinafter provided, and their successors, shall constitute a body corporate for the purpose of receiving and holding all sums of money and real and personal estate not exceeding in the aggregate four hundred thousand dollars, which may be given, granted, bequeathed or devised to it for the benefit of members of the Boston Fire Department and members of the Boston Protective Department or their families requiring assistance, or for the benefit of any persons, or the families of any persons, who have been such members, and who require assistance. The property so held and the corporation hereby created shall be known as the Boston Firemen's Relief Fund. The said corporation shall have authority to manage and dispose of the said fund and the income thereof, according to its discretion, subject to the provisions of any trusts which may be created for the purpose aforesaid.
