#### VI. HIGH COMMENDATION

With complete disregard for his own safety and at extreme personal risk, he searched until he located a young child and removed him to safety up to the roof, down the aerial to the street, performing mouth to mouth resuscitation until relieved by other members.

The Fire Commissioner is pleased to highly commend Fire Fighter Hardy for these exceptional actions and his case is referred to the Board of Merit for further consideration.

Because Fire Fighter Francis L. Shaughnessey's quick thinking and response undoubtedly saved the victim from further injury, perhaps saving her life, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter (Aide to District Fire Chief) Francis L. Shaughnessey in General Orders No. 20 of 1986.

On August 20, 1986, at 2218 hours, members of Ladder Company 24 observed from quarters a young male running erratically down the center of Cambridge Street in heavy traffic and being pursued by two other males. The pursuers alerted the members of Ladder Compny 24 that the person fleeing had assaulted two women. Fire Fighter on Probation Frank Rogier, Ladder Company 24, gave immediate chase on foot and was joined by Fire Captain James Evans, Engine Company 4, and Aide to District 3, Fire Fighter Edward

Finch, who were in contact with Fire Alarm via portable radio. The above members succeeded in subduing the man after a difficult chase through heavy traffic. The person was in an extremely crazed state and it took great effort and great personal risk to restrain him until the arrival of police. The Fire Alarm Office dispatched Engine Company 4 and Ladder Company 24 to assist.

The Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Captain James R. Evans, Engine Company 4, Fire Fighter on Probation Frank C. Rogier, Ladder Company 24, and Fire Fighter (Aide to District Fire Chief) Edward J. Finch, Ladder Company 24, in General Orders No. 32 of 1986, for their quick action and apprehension of the suspect which resulted in court conviction for assault and battery.

The Board recommended that Fire Captain James R. Evans, Engine Company 4, Fire Fighter on Probation Frank C. Rogier, Ladder Company 24 and Fire Fighter (Aide to District Fire Chief) Edward J. Finch, Ladder Company 24, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

Case of Fire Fighter on Probation William M. Gillis, Engine 3. Company 10

On September 19, 1986, at approximately 1440 hours, while members of Engine Company 10 were performing hydrant inspections on Winter Street, they observed a person being pursued by others and were alerted by a woman that her handbag had been stolen by the fleeing person.

Fire Fighter on Probation William M. Gillis, Engine Company 10, gave immediate chase on foot and with great effort and personal risk, succeeded in subduing the man on West Street. The police were summoned via portable radio and, upon arrival, placed the person under arrest.

The Fire Commissioner commended Fire Fighter on Probation William M. Gillis, Engine Company 10, in General Orders No. 39 of 1986, for his quick action and dedication to public service.

The Board recommended that Fire Fighter on Probation William M. Gillis, Engine Company 10, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

4. Case of Fire Fighter William J. Boyle, Jr., Engine Company 50

On October 9, 1986, at 0018 hours, Engine Company 50 responded to a Still Box 4146. Upon arrival, members were made aware of a male person attempting to commit suicide in a nearby apartment. His brother stated that he had already slashed both his arms and thighs with a knife. He had stabbed his brother in a previous incident and was extremely violent.

The members of Engine Company 50 immediately entered the apartment, found the victim on his feet bleeding from both arms and thighs and wielding a six inch knife. On approach, the victim made threatening gestures, forcing the members of Engine Company 50 to leave the building.

Fire Fighter William J. Boyle, Jr, Engine Company 50, entered the apartment. He made his way as close as possible to the victim and commenced talking to him in a confiding manner while being threatened with the knife repeatedly, as the man continued to stab himself. Fire Fighter Boyle remained in the apartment for approximately 40 minutes, talking to and gaining the confidence of this deranged individual. The victim finally surrendered the weapon, due to the persuasiveness and determined efforts of Fire Fighter Boyle.

Fire Fighter William J. Boyle showed complete disregard for his own personal safety, while exposed to extreme personal risk in performing this life saving act.

The Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter William J. Boyle, Jr., Engine Company 50, in General Orders No. 42 of 1986.

The Board recommended that Fire Fighter William J. Boyle, Jr., Engine Company 50, be awarded the Walter Scott Medal for Valor.

5. Case of Fire Fighter Robert M. Linnell, Engine Company 7

On November 12, 1986, at 0345 hours, Engine Company 7 responded to a Still Alarm, AFA Signal, for an alarm of fire at 78 Charles Street South, the Milner Hotel.

Upon arrival, heavy fire and smoke were reported from the fourth floor rear. Engine Company 7 advanced a 2 1/2" line via the interior front stairwell to the fourth floor where the members encountered heavy fire.

Before the line was charged, Fire Fighter Robert M. Linnell of Engine Company 7 heard screams from an upper floor. He proceeded to the fifth floor which was heavily charged with smoke. Fire was also extending up from the fourth floor via an outer court and a light shaft.

Fire Fighter Linnell made his way down the fifth floor hallway directly above the heavy fire and entered a room where he believed the cry originated. After crawling to a window, he observed a woman holding a year old child in one arm and an infant in the other at the edge of a roof. This woman had jumped from the roof of the fire building to an adjacent roof at 74 Warrenton Street. The woman had walked the ridge pole and apparently slipped or panicked and slid down the roof which had a 50 degree pitch.

Fire Fighter Linnell immediately removed his air mask and leaped out of the window which was in line with the edge of the pitched roof. He landed on his stomach and crawled across the roof some twenty feet until he reached the distraught woman and children. The woman had stopped her fall when her feet hit the gutter. Fire Fighter Linnell managed to hold each of the children and calm the woman who, in the opinion of fire, police officers and by-standers, was intent in jumping until the arrival of Ladder Company 15 who removed them to safety.

Because Fire Fighter Robert M. Linnell of Engine Company 7, by his quick action and at extreme personal risk to his own life, saved the lives of the woman and two children, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Orders No. 46 of 1986.

The Board recommended that Fire Fighter Robert M. Linnell, Engine Company 7, be awarded the John E. Fitzgerald Medal for the Most Meritorious Act.

6. Case of Fire Fighter Reynolds A. Shepherd, Ladder Company 17

On November 12, 1986, at 0345 hours, Ladder Company 17 responded to a Still Alarm, AFA Signal, for an alarm of fire at 78 Charles Street South, the Milner Hotel.

Upon arrival, Ladder Company 17 noted heavy smoke showing from the upper floors. Box 1512 was transmitted. Three alarms were eventually struck to control the fire and life hazard.

While ladders were being raised, Fire Fighter Reynolds A. Shepherd, Ladder Company 17, was ordered to the fourth floor where heavy fire and smoke were encountered from rooms to the left of a long corridor. Fire Fighter Shepherd heard screaming from the end of this corridor. He made his way down this hallway, past the fire in rooms to his left. Near the end of this passageway, he found a woman and two infants. They were in a desperate state. He carried the two children and led the woman back down the corridor, past the fire, to safety via the stairway to the street.

Because Fire Fighter Reynolds A. Shepherd, Ladder Company 17, performed these rescues at great personal risk and under extremely difficult conditions, before effective ventilation had been performed and while lines of hose were being run, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Orders No. 46 of 1986.

The Board recommended that the name of Fire Fighter Reynolds A. Shepherd, Ladder Company 17, be placed on the Roll of Merit.

7. Cases of Fire Lieutenant Richard L. Hartnett, Tower Unit Fire Fighter on Probation Gregory J. Mackin, Tower Unit

On December 9, 1986, at 1740 hours, the Tower Unit responded to a Still Alarm for One Post Office Square, Box 13-1283 (6 alarms). Upon arrival, it was reported that several explosions were heard in the basement and that persons working in the electrical room may be trapped.

Members of the Tower Unit, Engine 10 and Rescue 1 descended down the stairway through heavy, black smoke, while explosions were continuing, to the sub-basement.

Fire Lieutenant Richard L. Hartnett and Fire Fighter on Probation Gregory J. Mackin of the Tower Unit heard a victim calling for help in the electrical switching gear room. They entered the room and made an intensive search down passageways lined with burning and exploding electrical equipment and with no visibility to assist them.

They located a semi-conscious, seriously burned worker. While Lieutenant Hartnett removed his face mask and placed it on the victim, Fire Fighter on Probation Mackin worked his way back to the room entrance and directed Lieutenant Hartnett with the victim back to safety.

Both of these members performed these duties under very hazardous conditions and at great personal risk. The Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Lieutenant Richard L. Hartnett and Fire Fighter on Probation Gregory J. Mackin, Tower Unit, in General Orders No. 1 of 1987.

The Board recommended that Fire Lieutenant Richard L. Hartnett, Tower Unit, be awarded the Patrick J. Kennedy Medal of Honor.

The Board recommended that the name of Fire Fighter on Probation Gregory J. Mackin, Tower Unit, be placed on the Roll of Merit.

## AWARD OF RECOGNITION

On February 6, 1987, the Board of Merit of the Boston Fire Department created the City of Boston Fire Department Award of Recognition.

This award is to be presented at the Annual Ball of the Boston Fire Department only when it has been voted by the Board of Merit in any given year.

The Recognition Award is intended for a member of the Uniformed Force who has performed a service or services that have resulted in improving the performance of the department at fires and/or contributed to the safety of members of the firefighting force.

The first recipient of the City of Boston Fire Department Award of Recognition is Fire Lieutenant Paul H. Dewan, Jr., of Ladder Company 17.

Commencing with his assignment as the Department Safety Officer in February 1984, Fire Lieutenant Paul H. Dewan, Jr., has made a major contribution to the improvement of firefighting operations and the safety of members of the firefighting forces.

He has conducted continuous field tests of breathing apparatus, protective clothing, personal safety lights and warning devices, and has thereby improved the performance of each of these items. He has developed revised apparatus specifications that have resulted in the replacement of 75% of the first line apparatus in the department.

His continuing efforts have thereby provided the citizens of Boston with more effective fire protection and have reflected great credit on the City of Boston and its Fire Department.

# I. DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF ROBERT O. MACINNES

It is with deep regret that the Fire Commissioner announces the death on May 16, 1987 of District Fire Chief Robert O. MacInnes, District 10. District Fire Chief MacInnes was appointed to the department February 3, 1947, promoted to Fire Lieutenant March 12, 1958, promoted to Fire Captain October 25, 1967 and promoted to District Fire Chief May 4, 1977.

The funeral was held from the Paul H. Kraw Funeral Home, 1248 Washington Street, Norwood, at 0845 hours, Tuesday, May 19, 1987, followed by a Funeral Service at the Christ Church, 1220 River Street, Hyde Park, at 1000 hours.

The Fire Commissioner made the customary detail to act as funeral escort and members from the Training and Maintenance Division, Fire Prevention Division, Headquarters Division and the Rifle Honor Guard were excused to attend the services.
