The above delegation of authority, effective as of January 31, 1991, shall continue in force and effect for a period of one year from the effective date, unless revoked at any time prior thereto. The above delegations of authority are not to diminish nor curtail any of the powers conferred upon me by said General Laws, Chapter 148, Sections 4 & 5.

112TH ANNUAL BALL AND AWARDS CEREMONY

The 112th Annual Ball and Awards Ceremony of the Boston Fire Department will be held Friday, May 24, 1991, at the Park Plaza Hotel, Boston.

BOARD OF MERIT

The Board of Merit, consisting of the Fire Commissioner and the Deputy Fire Chiefs, has considered all meritorious acts referred to it during the year 1990. After careful consideration and study, the Board submitted the following recommendations which are hereby approved by the Fire Commissioner:

1. Case of Fire Fighter David A. Glover, Engine Company 10

At 2126 hours, February 2, 1990, a serious accident occurred at the intersection of A and West Fourth Streets, District 6,, when a taxicab struck a lumber truck broadside, shearing off the hood of the cab down to the engine block and pushing the truck approximately twenty feet. Gasoline, released from the carburetor, immediately ignited, engulfing the engine compartment of the taxi.

Fire Fighter David A. Glover, Engine Company 10, who was off duty at the time, immediately went to the assistance of the victims, removing both from the burning vehicle. He then procured a fire extinguisher, extinguished the fire, and then performed first-aid on the injured victims.

Because Fire Fighter Glover performed these acts prior to the arrival of fire apparatus, without the use of personal safety equipment and without consideration for his own safety, reflecting credit upon himself and the Boston Fire Department, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Order No. 8 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter David A. Glover, Engine Company 10, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

2. Cases of Fire Fighter Patrick L. McDonough, Engine Company 22
Fire Fighter Joe E. Montoya, Engine Company 22

On February 10, 1990, at 0300 hours, a Boston Police Officer, while on patrol on Tremont Street, was stopped by a group of people that stated two men in a blue Pontiac pulled a gun on them. The officer located the vehicle on Tremont Street and gave pursuit. The suspects crashed their car into parked vehicles on Tremont Street near Engine Company 22's quarters. A violent struggle ensued. The police officer was punched and kicked by one of the suspects. The second suspect came to his friend's aid. The police officer was now fighting with both suspects, one of whom had a gun. The second suspect was found to have possession of a knife.

Fire Fighter Patrick L. McDonough and Fire Fighter Joe E. Montoya, both on duty at Engine Company 22's quarters, 700 Tremont Street, District 4, heard the commotion outside. They observed a group of people around a crashed vehicle with a police officer being attacked by what appeared to be three individuals, while other spectators were yelling and shouting. Fire Fighters McDonough and Montoya, without regard for their own safety, immediately went to the aid of the police officer. They grappled and held on to two other individuals, one being a victim of the crash attempting to attack the suspect, but interfering with the police officer. The officer was able to handcuff the first suspect. Fire Fighters McDonough and Montoya helped to control the suspects until the arrival of additional police officers.

Because Fire Fighters Patrick L. McDonough and Joe E. Montoya of Engine Company 22 performed this action at extreme personal risk, reflecting credit upon themselves and the Boston Fire Department, the Fire Commissioner highly commended them in General Order No. 21 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Patrick L. McDonough and Fire Fighter Joe E. Montoya, Engine Company 22, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

3. Case of Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone, Ladder Company 10

On May 16, 1990, while Ladder Company 10 was operating as a fire detail, Box 6-2255, Incident #15869, Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone, while at the right side of the fire building, observed two Boston Police Officers in foot pursuit of a male person. Without hesitation, Fire Fighter Malone jumped a five foot fence equipped with barbed wire, receiving a laceration to his hand and dropping ten feet to the ground where he tackled and subdued the fleeing person until the arrival of the police in pursuit. The suspect was wanted for a series of crimes in the area and placed under arrest.

Because Fire Fighter Malone performed this act in the presence of many spectators, reflecting credit upon himself and the Boston Fire Department, while at great personal risk to himself and without knowledge of the suspect having a weapon in his possession, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Order No. 21 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone, Ladder Company 10, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

4. Case of Fire Captain Paul V. Farren, Personnel Division (Detailed to Ladder Company 23)

On March 5, 1990, at 1345 hours, Box 3356 was struck for a building fire at 56 Columbia Road, District 7, for which 3 alarms were sounded.

Heavy smoke was showing from the front of the building upon the arrival of Engine Company 24 and Ladder Company 23. With a report of children trapped inside and while Engine Company 24 was advancing a line to the first floor with heavy fire showing on the side of the building and before ventilation was performed, Fire Captain Paul V. Farren, Personnel Division (detailed to Ladder Company 23), entered the fire room via the right side of the front porch. While searching the room, Fire Captain Farren located a child in a crib, placed his facepiece on the child's face and while proceeding to exit, became disoriented due to intense heat and smoke. Fire Fighter Robert H. Lindsay of Ladder Company 23 entered the same window and assisted Captain Farren in handing the child to Fire Fighter Eric A. Singleton of Engine Company 41, who was off duty.

Because Fire Captain Paul V. Farren performed this act under extreme personal risk to himself, before proper ventilation had been performed or lines of hose in place, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Order No. 21 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Captain Paul V. Farren, Personnel Division (detailed to Ladder Company 23) be awarded the John E. Fitzgerald Medal for the Most Meritorious Act.

5. Case of Fire Fighter Edward T. Loder, Rescue Company 1

Fire Fighter Edward T. Loder, Rescue Company 1, is hereby highly commended for his actions at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel at 2134 hours, May 30, 1990, Incident #17728.

A woman, with suicide apparently in mind, was perched on a window sill of the 16th floor of the hotel and threatening to jump.

Following a period of almost two hours of negotiations that were unsuccessful, Fire Fighter Loder was lowered from the roof to a position directly opposite the woman and was able to push her with his foot into the room where others were able to restrain her.

This action, which occurred 180 feet above the street, exposed Fire Fighter Loder to extreme personal risk and there is no doubt it saved the life of the victim because her deteriorating physical and mental conditions would have resulted in her falling or jumping from the ledge.

Because Fire Fighter Loder performed this act without consideration for his own personal safety, reflecting credit upon himself and the Boston Fire Department, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Order No. 26 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Edward T. Loder, Rescue Company 1, be awarded the Walter Scott Medal for Valor.

6. Cases of Fire Fighter James M. Hardy, Rescue Company 1
Fire Fighter Robert P. Breen, Rescue Company 1

On July 7, 1990, at 0122 hours, Incident #22967, Rescue Company 1 responded to a still alarm for Route 93 northbound on report of a woman attempting suicide.

Upon arrival, members observed a woman sitting on the edge of an "I" Beam some 100 feet above the Charles River, with attempts by members of the State Police to coax the woman down. When it became evident that the person would not return to safety on her own, Fire Fighter James M. Hardy of Rescue Company 1 donned a safety harness with lifeline and climbed over a rail onto a beam below and behind the person. When the woman observed him, Fire Fighter Hardy dashed along the beam and took hold of her. A struggle ensued as the woman took hold of a pipe. At that time Fire Fighter Robert P. Breen of Rescue Company 1 climbed over the rail and freed the woman's hand and both members quickly removed her to safety.

Because these members performed this rescue at great personal risk, without regard for their own safety, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighters James M. Hardy and Robert P. Breen of Rescue Company 1 in General Order No. 32 of 1990.

The Board recommends that the names of Fire Fighter James M. Hardy and Fire Fighter Robert P. Breen, Rescue Company 1, be placed on the Roll of Merit.

7. Case of Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone, Ladder Company 10

On June 22, 1990, at 2135 hours, Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone of Ladder Company 10, while off duty and driving on South Huntington Avenue, District 9, observed a male riding a bicycle being attacked by a knife wielding person attempting to steal the bicycle. Fire Fighter Malone alighted from his vehicle and chased the subject.

As he was about to tackle him, the suspect stopped and turned, stabbing Fire Fighter Malone with the knife on the left side of his chest. As he was about to be stabbed again, an unknown civilian tackled the suspect. In the attempt to subdue the suspect, Fire Fighter Malone was kicked several times to the head, requiring treatment by members of the Boston Health & Hospitals at the scene. Boston Police arrived and placed the suspect under arrest.

Because he performed this act at great personal risk, without regard for his own safety, reflecting credit upon himself and the Boston Fire Department, the Fire Commissioner highly commended Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone of Ladder Company 10 in General Order No. 34 of 1990.

The Board recommends that Fire Fighter Scott J. Malone, Ladder Company 10, be awarded the Distinguished Service Award.

8. Case of Fire Fighter Anthony J. O'Brien, Rescue Company 1

On August 24, 1990, at 1755 hours, Incident #29397, Engine Company 39, Ladder Company 18, Rescue Company 1, Marine Unit and Underwater Recovery Team responded to a still alarm for the World Trade Center, 164 Northern Avenue, District 6, on report of a sinking boat with two male occupants in the water.

First arriving members located a man who had made his way to the pier where he was assisted from the water by members of Engine Company 39. Further investigation revealed no trace of the other occupant or the boat.

Fire Fighter Anthony J. O'Brien of Rescue Company 1 voluntarily mounted a rail and dove about 25' into the water to effect a search while Fire Fighter William J. Hegarty of Rescue Company 1, wearing a floatation suit, jumped into the water to observe and assist. Fire Fighter O'Brien, after repeated dives under the pier in an attempt to locate the victim and while encountering dangerous obstacles and debris, located the sunken boat. Due to complete exhaustion, Fire Fighter O'Brien was ordered removed from the water. The Underwater Recovery Team, while operating from the Marine Unit, located and removed the other victim from the water.

Because Fire Fighter Anthony J. O'Brien, Rescue Company 1, without benefit of protective clothing, performed under adverse conditions, without regard for his own safety and at great personal risk, the Fire Commissioner highly commended him in General Order No. 34 of 1990.

The Board recommends that the name of Fire Fighter Anthony J. O'Brien, Rescue Company 1, be placed on the Roll of Merit.

9. Award of Recognition

Fire Captain Richard L. Hartnett, Special Services Division

Fire Captain Richard L. Hartnett, Special Services Division, has successfully managed the implementation of the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act of 1986 (S.A.R.A. Title III) by the Boston Fire Department.

Through this program, facilities that use hazardous materials have been identified, and those who utilize these materials have been brought into compliance with the regulation of this law. This has provided the Boston Fire Department with a pre-incident plan for emergencies at these facilities.

Because of the successful implementation of this program, the safety of workers at the facilities, community residents and emergency responders have been greatly enhanced.

The Board recommends that Fire Captain Richard L. Hartnett, Special Services Division, be awarded the Award of Recognition.

10. Award of Recognition

Fire Lieutenant William J. Ostiguy, Personnel Division

Fire Lieutenant William J. Ostiguy, Personnel Division, is responsible for the operations of the Boston Fire Department/Local 718 Employee Assistance Program. He was instrumental in the implementation of this program in conjunction with members of the Boston Fire Department and Local 718.

Fire Lieutenant Ostiguy does an excellent job assisting the members of the department with their many and various problems and in some cases providing counselling by qualified personnel. He has improved the operations of the Employee Assistance Program and was instrumental in the adoption of the Boston Fire Department's Substance Abuse Program. He has always shown a deep concern for the health and welfare of all members and in doing so he has made a positive impact on the effectiveness and morale of the department.

The Board recommends that Fire Lieutenant William J. Ostiguy, Personnel Division, be awarded the Award of Recognition.
