

CONFLAGRATION IN CAMBRIDGEPORT.—A WHOLE SQUARE BURNED OVER.—On Saturday evening, about 9½ o'clock, a fire broke out in Pike's or Wood's stable, between Main and Austin streets, Cambridgeport, opposite the old hotel, and was not subdued until it had swept everything on Main street, from the Bank to the corner of Norfolk street, extending across to Austin street, burning over the space of about two acres.

A fresh breeze prevailed during the greater part of the time, and the buildings being of wood, together with a scarcity of water, rendered the exertions of the firemen for a long time unavailing. The fire was not brought under control until 2 or 3 o'clock on Sunday morning. The fire companies had to take their water from near the bridge, and at one time fourteen tubs were employed to throw a single stream. The fire companies exerted themselves to the utmost. among the out of town companies were Melville No. 6, and Cataract No. 4, of Boston; the Butcher Boy and Charles River, of Brighton; No. 1 of Medford; No. 1 of Somerville; No. 1 of West Cambridge; Hamilton No. 4 of Chelsea; and Nos. 1 and 5 of Charlestown. There were also present engines from Watertown, Roxbury and Lynn.
