





PRESENTATION OF MEDALS

FIRE COMMISSIONER MICHAEL T. KELLEHER

The Board of Merit has brought to the attention of the Fire Commissioner the following outstanding cases in which members of this department have specially distinguished themselves for valor in the performance of their duty.

The Commissioner, therefore, makes the following awards:

"John E. Fitzgerald Medal" DISTRICT CHIEF JOSEPH F. KILDUFF of Districts 9-10

At 3:50 P.M., March 11, 1949, the department responded to an alarm from Box 3135 for a fire in the dwelling house at 54 Langdon Street, Roxbury. Upon arrival of the department, fire involved the entire kitchen of the second floor and was extending

through windows to the rear wooden piazza and to the third floor.

District Chief Joseph F. Kilduff of Districts 9-10 was informed by the occupant of the second floor, who was in the street, that her infant child was in the second floor of the burning dwelling house. District Chief Kilduff attempted to gain entrance to the second floor by the front stairway but was unable to do so on account of heat, heavy smoke and gases. He immediately proceeded to the rear stairway and thence to the second floor under difficult conditions. After a search, he found the child on the floor in a bedroom. He carried the infant to the street where mother and child were placed in a police ambulance and removed to Boston City Hospital.

As District Chief Kilduff was the first member of the department to arrive at the scene of the fire, his prompt action and the risk to which he exposed himself during the rescue work undoubtedly saved the infant from serious injury or death.

He was highly commended by the Fire Commissioner in General Orders No. 18.

The Board of Merit, consisting of the Chief of Department, and the Deputy Chiefs, is pleased to recommend that District Chief Joseph F. Kilduff be awarded the, "John E. Fitzgerald Medal".

"Walter Scott Medal"

LIEUTENANT-AIDE TO COMMISSIONER WILLIAM H. BELL of Headquarters

Box 2761 was sounded at 1:25 A.M., February 20, 1949, followed by 2nd alarm at 1:37 A.M. and 3rd alarm at 2:08 A.M., for a fire at 1-9 Corinth Street and 22-26 Belgrade Avenue, Roslindale. The former Fire Commissioner, Russell S. Cod-

man, Jr. and the Chief of Department responded to this box.

During the course of operations, the building was ordered vacated because of the large amount of fire, and severe smoke and gas condition. The danger of an explosion was present. It was rumored that Hoseman John A. Abbott of Engine Co. 26 had failed to vacate the basement. The Commissioner and his Aide entered the building in order to warn Hoseman Abbott to vacate. The Commissioner covered his Aide with a line while he searched through the basement. (It was later found out that Hoseman Abbott had left the building.)

After several minutes of investigation, Aide to Commissioner Bell proceeded to leave the basement. On his way out he stumbled across the body of a person who proved to be the Fire Commissioner. He had been overcome from inhalation of smoke and gases due to a clogged gas mask. Aide Bell lifted and dragged Commissioner and gases due to a cogged gas mass. And Ben introd and cragged Commissioner Codman to the outside where he collapsed. Both were taken to the Boston City Hospital and treated. Aide to Commissioner William H. Bell displayed great courage and was subjected to intense heat and smoke, involving personal risk, while effecting this rescue. The Board of Merit is pleased to recommended the awarding of the "Walter Scott Medal" to Lieutenant-Aide to Commissioner William H. Bell.

Use or Misuse

In the plan of the Creator, all things fit into their proper places. It is only when we mortals try to find a better place for things that trouble comes to us. As there is a proper place, there is also a PROPER USE for things.

Do you sometimes clean garments with gasoline? Many hundreds of folks have done so and are no longer with us. . . They died because they violated one of the basic laws of safety. They did not remember that gasoline is essentially a motor not a cleaning fluid. In other words, death came not from the USE but the MISUSE of gasoline.

Let's consider the cigarette. . . The primary purpose is to please-but by its MISUSE we have made it an instrument of destruction. The lowly match is one of the greatest conveniences known to man. . . Properly used, it is a most beneficial implement. . . MISUSE it and it becomes an enemy of man and all his works. That familiar phrase "Careless Use of Smoker's Articles" might well read "Misuse of Smoker's Articles."

So it goes. . . We try to make electricity do what it is not intended to do. . . We try to make one outlet do the work of two. . . We MISUSE the energy and its appurtenances-which causes fire! Again, MISUSE, not USE is the fault.

Remember, then, that just as all things have their proper place in the plan of the great Architect, so, too, they have a PROPER


