

#### THE BOSTON FIREMEN'S RELIEF FUND

#### PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Boston Firemen's Relief Fund was organized in 1879 and incorporated under the statutes of Massachusetts in 1909 and is now completing seventy-five years of successful operation.

Every man appointed permanently to the department automatically is eligible for assistance from the Boston Firemen's Relief Fund from the day he is appointed.

The proceeds from this ball are used to pay doctor's bills and hospitalization of members injured in the performance of their duty, also to assist dependents of deceased firefighters.

## PRESENTATION OF ROLL OF MERIT

#### HON. JOHN B. HYNES, MAYOR

At 7:36 A.M., on November 22, 1953, the department responded to an alarm from box 3654 for a fire in a building at 45-53 Adams Street, Milton. During the fire, Hoseman Arthur C. Morton of Engine Co. 16 was operating a line of hose inside the building on the third floor was thrown into the cellar due to a sudden collapse of the

Immediately, with total disregard for their own safety, Assistant Chief of Department Walter E. Crouch, followed by Lieutenant James G. Boles of Ladder Company 6 and Hoseman John E. Kelly of Engine Company 16 slid down the line of hose into the cellar. They found Hoseman Morton, unconscious, trapped in the wreckage, with his right foot wedged under a heavy beam.

They removed the debris which covered the victim and because of the heavy weight of the beam, lifted him bodily in such a manner so that his right leg could be slipped out of his rubber boot, thus freeing him.

This rescue work had to be done with great care in order to prevent additional wreckage from falling and trapping the victim and his rescuers. After freeing Hoseman Morton, they carried him to a point of safety where other members removed him to a waiting ambulance.

The prompt action, courage and resourcefulness displayed by these members in effecting this rescue saved Hoseman Morton from serious injury and possible suffocation.

At 3:16 P.M. October 16, 1953 the department responded to Box 7545 (2 alarms) for a fire aboard the U.S.S. Leyte, which was docked at the South Boston Navy Yard

Upon arrival of apparatus at the scene, Captaint Fred T. Willett, Hoseman Francis J. Hurley and Hoseman William H. Hurley of Engine Co. 2 received information that members of the crew of the Leyte were trapped below. They donned allservice masks and descended to the deck below the hangar deck for the purpose of rescuing members of the crew. They passed through a door in a bulkhead but found the heat unbearable and had to return to the hangar deck where they procured a 11/2" line and stretched it down a gangway in order to extinguish the fire or dissipate the

extreme heat. About this time, Hoseman Francis J. Hurley had difficulty in breathing and went toward the gangway where he collapsed and was carried up to the hangar deck from whence he was removed to the hospital. Meanwhile, the all-service mask worn by Captain Willet apparently became fouled or clogged, and he lost consciousness. Hoseman William H. Hurley of Engine Co. 2, who had gone to the hangar deck to procure Chemox masks, again descended to the deck below accompanied by Lieutenant Robert J. Crawford of Engine Co. 39. They found the unconscious form of Captain Willett and carried him up to the hangar deck from whence he was removed to the hospital.

Later, at another incident at the fire, Hoseman Lawrence T. White of Engine Co. 26, wearing a Chemox mask, descended with other members of the department to the second deck below the hangar deck for the purpose of recovering the bodies of victims of the fire. They came across the body of a crew member in a small room off a passageway, and Hoseman White entered the room to assist placing the body in a stretcher. Because of the confined area in which he had to work and the exertion required, he became exhausted and was assisted up the gangway by other members of the department and was removed to the hospital.

## PRESENTATION OF HIGH COMMENDATIONS

FIRE COMMISSIONER FRANCIS X. COTTER

At 9:15 P.M., March 1, 1953, the department responded to an alarm from Box 2524 for a fire in the dwelling house at 41 Everett Street, Jamaica Plain.

Upon arrival at the scene, it was found that a portable oil burner had overturned in a second floor bedroom causing a fire and trapping two small children. Lieut, Raymond E. Favret of Ladder Co. 10 and Hoseman Edward H. Hanbury of Engine Co. 28 proceeded to the second floor, forced their way through a burning paper wallboard partition which blocked entrance to the bedroom, entering the room which was then fully involved with fire, heat and smoke where they found the two children and carried them to the street

#### Lieutenant JOSEPH P. ANDERSON, Engine Co. 12 Hoseman POMPIO J. MAGISTRI, Engine Co. 12

At 2:09 P.M., February 12, 1953, the department responded to an alarm from Box 2134 for a fire in a dwelling house at 2 Hubbard Terrace, Roxbury.

Upon arrival at the fire, Lieutenant Joseph P. Anderson and Hoseman Pompio J. Magistri of Engine Co. 12 were informed that two children were trapped in a second floor apartment which was involved in fire. They entered the second floor apartment, which had not been ventilated, made their way into the bedroom which was heavily charged with heat, smoke and flame, groped around until they found the two children in a bed, and carried them from the room. Both children suffered severe burns and were unconscious when taken from the premises.

Because of the fact that the above mentioned members of the department performed the above rescue work under very difficult conditions and exposed themselves to great personal danger, the Fire Commissioner is pleased to commend them highly.
