THE "BIGHCUSE" OPENS

November 10, 1930-- A modern first-class fireproof fire station was opened today, in Bowdoin Square. The new station was erected at a cost of \$347905.03, excluding land; and will house Engine 4; Engine 6; Iad. 24; Rescue 3; Tower 1; and District Chief 4.

(from BFD Ann. Report - 1930)

1930 - A "REALLY BIG" YEAR....

For the BFD, it was a "BIG" year...along with closing of firehouses on Bulfinch St. (E4); Leverett St. (E6); and North Grove St. (124); some 36 motor vehicles were purchased and put in service...included were 10 hose wagons; 1 pump; 3 trucks (two aerials); 2 Federal Rescue wagons; 9 Hupmobile sedans; 4 Hupmobile coupes; etc.... Fire-wise they had a "Big" year: 87 seconds - 20 thirds - 3 fourths - - 1 fifth - and 1 six-alarm fire (lumber yeard in Charlestown --5 on box 4147 - 1 on Box 4162, on July 4th at 7:00 p.m.) and the "Iron Men" of 1930 fought 6 fires with damage over \$100000,00 in each...

A BIG change was made in the BFD in 1930...Boston Automatic Alarms were sent out by Fire Alarm Office...previously, Boston Automatic sent out the 2-2-2 alarms directly to the firehouses in the area of the alarm.....

The BFD Band was formed, 150 men strong; and made its first public appearance in the Tercentenary Parade on Sept. 17, 1930.

"build a new fireboat to replace one of the 3 now in service".... a part of this recommendation was accepted 25 years later...in 1955 Engine 44 was deactivated....

To operate the Boston Fire Department in 1930, it cost \$4,642,216.53, aside from cost of new fire stablons.

WORK WEEK - BFD

In any week from 8:00 a.m. Sunday thru 8:00 a.m. the follow-ing Sunday, there are 168 hours.

Prior to 1924, Boston Firefighters worked 120 hours a week: 48 on - and then 24 off duty. That was called "The Day in Three". A full-paid Private got 24.34 for 120 hours, or 1265.68 a year.

On February 1, 1924, the "Two-Platoon System" was inaugurated whereby he worked only 84 hours a week; having 24 consecutive hours off every 6th day.

When the ""Bighouse" opened, in 1930, with an 84-hour week, the salaries were:

Keep in mind that it took some THIRTY YEARS to make them changes. LOCAL 718 IS BORN....

In April of 1942, Boston Fire Fighters Local 718 - IAFF - AFT was Chartered; and MANY members of the "Bighouse" signed that Charter.

At the Convention of the State Association of Firefighters in Springfield, Mass. in 1945, the 48-hour work week for Firefighters was initiated. Legislation was passed, and Boston Firefighters took advantage of it, by going on the Ballot.

The Labor Day Parade of 1946 found 1000 Boston Firefighters in line, headed by the Fire Commissioner, Russell Codman Jr. The voters of Boston responded by a 9 to 1 purality, in granting their Firefighters a 48-hour work week, in the November 4th, 1946 election. The Law took effect 90 days later, and on February 4th, 1947, the 84 hour week was gone forever in the BFD.

A NEW ERA AT THE "BIGHOUSE"

on February 15, 1946, Engine 10 was temporarily relocated to Bowdoin Square while a new house was being erected. From that date till the 4th of February 1947, the "Bighouse" had no equal in all the World as regards to manpower and/or, fire companies. For almost a year, just prior to the 48-hour week, Bowdoin Sq. house had within its confines Engine 4, Engine 6, Engine 10, Ladder 1, Ladder 24, Rescue 3 and District Chief 4.

The life of the BFD was very much altered on February 4th, 1947. And the "Bighouse" was a part of it, With Engine 6 being deactivated, and the 48-hour week starting the same day, MANY new faces appeared on the fire companies in the "Square".

LADDER ONE RELOCATED ENGINE TEN LEAVES BOWDOIN SQ. On September 22nd, 1948, Lad. 1 left the "Bighouse" for relocation to a new house on Hanover Street, with Engine 8.

At 10:00 a.m., Thursday, April 14th, 1949, Engine 10 left Bowdown Square to be housed in the new station on River Street, Beacon Hill.

ENGINE SIX REACTIVATED

On April 27th, 1949, Engine 6 was reactivated in the "Bighouse" with the following named assigned: Capt. Charles Fleming; Capt. Raymond Frazel; Lt. Edward Owens; Lt. John Rose; HOSEMEN: Hanry Rose; Alec Panasuk; Henry Miller; James Sheehan; John J. McDonough; Ralph Berry; Cornelius Quinlan; Thomas Hurley: Ralph DiCarolas; Robert Doheney; Arthur Marr; Roger Gregg; Joseph Schiller; and Harold Matul aitis.

During the 5 years and 3 months that Engine 6 was back in service, the "Bighouse" didn't change too much. Lighting Plant 1 was added to the house...the fires were put out.

The demise of the "Bighouse" started on July 13th, 1954, when Engine 6 was again deactivated. Housed in Bowdoin Square on that date were, Engine 4; Lad.24; Tower 1, Rescue 3; L.P. 1 and District 4. Within a matter of months, the Tower and Lighting Plant would lose their manpower, and Rescue would no longer have a "3" attached to it.

As we approach the dying days of the "Big House", we find it to be the end of a grand era. Since that day in November 1930, when fire apparatus first graced it's floors, and Firefighters started living within it's walls, the "Big House" has been a symbol of the Boston Fire Department at its very best.

Just as it is in all other walks of life - - so it is in the Fire Department. It takes "all kinds" to make up this world we live in.

During the past tharty-one au one half years, the "Big House" has seen practically every type man that God has ever created. The "iron-men" who worked one-hundred twenty hours a week and the "hemen" of the 48-hour week. The mex who gave their lives doing their job as Firefighters. And the few who didn't "give a damn" for any thing or anyone. Yes - it took "all kinds" to make up the forces in the "Big House".

By and large, the men who service as members of companies in the "Big House" are better men

There were many "laughs" --- and there were a few tears from within the walls of what is now called "Fort Apache".

From here we say: WE ARE PROUD TO HAVE BEEN PART OF THE BEST FIREHOUSE IN THE BEST FIRE DEPARTMENT IN THE WORLD.
