SUPERINTENDENT AND FIRE MARSHAL'S REPORT.

HEAD-QUARTERS BOSTON PROTECTIVE DEPARTMENT,

TO THE PRESIDENT AND DIRECTORS OF THE DEPARTMENT:

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit the Tenth Annual Report of this Department, for the year ending March 1, 1884.

The report embraces, in the annexed tables, the roster of the officers and members of the department; resignations and appointments; a monthly statement of the alarms of fires, and duty performed by the department, together with the amount of insurance and loss on buildings and contents, a classification of covers spread, the districts where the alarms of fire were given, the causes of fires and alarms, a comparison of losses and premiums received, a statement of benefits paid to members of this department from the Boston Firemen's Relief Fund on account of sickness. Up to May 10, 1883, the organization of the department continued the same as last year. But at the fires Dec. 30, 1882, Nos. 161 and 165 Pearl Street; and April 6, 1883, Hotel Berkeley, the fact was demonstrated that to place the department on a permanent basis in the city proper would be for the best interests of the Insurance Companies. Therefore upon the above date the organization of the department was changed by the appointing of eight (8) permanent men, "four to each company," since which time the efficiency of the department has been improved.

The expenses of the department have been increased, owing to the above change in the organization, and the purchasing of one hundred (100) covers, which was necessary owing to the large quantity that the department have been obliged to spread at fires, also to the purchasing of a new wagon for the superintendent, and a new pung for Company No. 2.

Four (4) covers were destroyed at the fire 101 and 103 West Canton Street, Sept. 12, 1883, owing to the side wall of brick

building falling on to the frame ell of the adjoining dwelling and burying the covers.

In conclusion, I desire to express my sincere thanks to the President, James Sword, Esq., and the Board of Directors, for their uniform kindness and coöperation, and also to the officers and members of this department for their promptness in the faithful discharge of their duties; also to the Board of Fire Commissioners, Chief Engineer Green and Assistant Engineers, Superintendent Flanders of the Fire Alarm Department, and all the officers and members of the Boston Fire Department, together with the officers and members of the Boston Police Department, also reporters, for their courtesies and assistance at fires.
